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# INTRODUCTION

## City of Hinton

The City of Hinton is located in southern West Virginia and is the county seat for Summers County. Hinton is located along the New River and its confluence with the Greenbrier River as shown on **Map 1: Location Map**. The City was established in the 1870s as a pivotal railroad town for the Chesapeake and Ohio (C&O) Railroad Company. The City developed dramatically in the late 1800s and early 1900s.



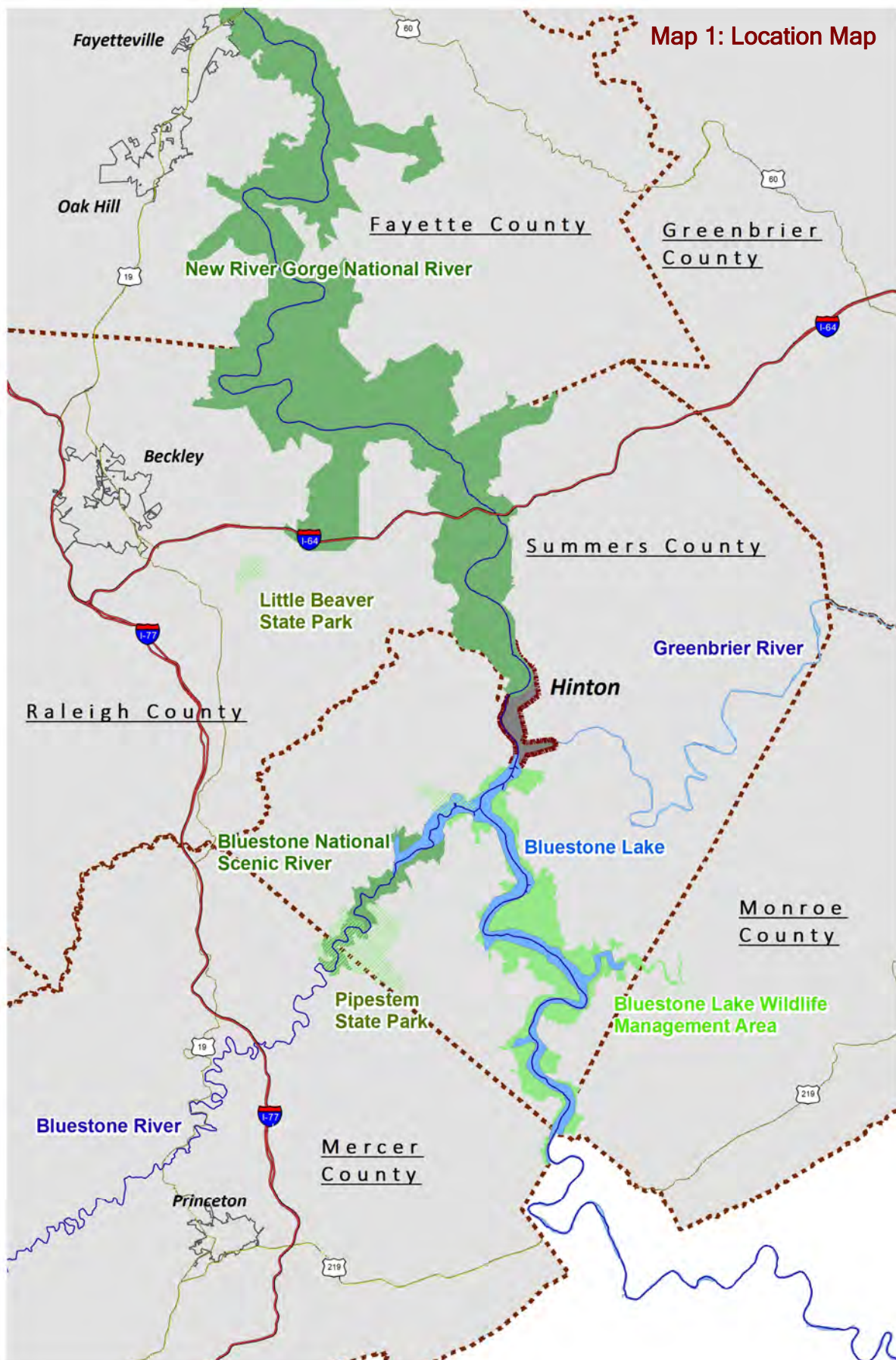
Several local businesses were established, and the C&O Railroad Company constructed a roundhouse that employed several residents from Hinton. Hinton had continued success throughout the coal boom, the construction of the Bluestone Dam, and the establishment of Bluestone State Park. The city's unique history remains visible in the many historic buildings that exist within city limits. However, in recent years, the city has lost population and several key businesses. With the coal industry decline and subsequent economic losses, the City of Hinton needs of direction and change in order to prosper.

Local elected officials realize that the city needs vision to move forward. As a result, this comprehensive planning effort was started. A comprehensive plan will help the city realize its potential and build on its key assets. The comprehensive plan is a policy document that will prioritize projects important to residents and business owners and provide land use guidance for future development and revitalization efforts. City council should use this plan when a decision needs to be made regarding a development proposal, capital improvements project, or policy change. The plan should also be used to show community support in grant applications.

# WEST VIRGINIA CODE REQUIREMENTS

The West Virginia Code outlines several provisions that must be included in a comprehensive plan, as well as details how local governments must receive public input and adopt a comprehensive plan. The City of Hinton Planning Commission consists of five (5) members that represent a wide range of interests within the town. The City of Hinton Planning Commission, with assistance by the West Virginia University College of Law Land Use and Sustainable Development Law Clinic, is tasked with developing the plan pursuant to West Virginia Code, Chapter 8A: Land Use Planning.

Once the plan is adopted, the planning commission should begin implementation. The plan should be reviewed annually to determine progress and next steps. Any new development or proposed zoning change within the City of Hinton must be consistent with the comprehensive plan. The plan must be updated every ten (10) years.

The tables below display the mandatory elements required by the West Virginia Code and where the elements can be found in this plan.

# VISION STATEMENT

The catalyst for change in any community comes from its residents. To guide overall plan development, the planning commission first created a vision statement to capture the wishes and dreams of city residents.

**Hinton is a vibrant and historic town where rivers and friends meet. Located in southeastern West Virginia, on the banks of the Greenbrier and New Rivers, Hinton is a central hub for great people and community organizations to gather and collaborate. Hinton prides itself on its history but is looking to the future.**

After the vision statement was created, the planning commission reached out to residents and business owners to hear their concerns. For this plan to be successful and initiate change, the public was involved throughout the process. Public input procedures were developed and can be found in **Appendix 1**. Many different methods were used to gather public input, including:

- Two (2) open houses
- Online survey
- Stakeholder Interviews

Two open houses were held on April 29, 2019, one was held in the afternoon and the other in the evening. Attendees were asked to share their ideas on how to improve Hinton. A summary of the results can be found in **Appendix 2**.





An online survey was created to gather more information from residents, especially those that did not attend the open houses. The survey asked questions regarding quality of life and what was most important for Hinton to improve. Results from the online survey are described in more detail throughout the comprehensive plan. The results of the survey can be found in **Appendix 3**.

The planning commission conducted stakeholder interviews with key members of the community. Stakeholders provide valuable insight on specific needs within a community. A complete list of stakeholders can be found in **Appendix 4**.





# FOCUS AREAS

The information gathered from the planning commission, open houses, stakeholder interviews, and online survey were used to identify key issues and concerns in Hinton. Four (4) specific concerns were consistently identified throughout the planning process and form the focus areas of the comprehensive plan. Each focus area was examined in detail. Goals and objectives were then developed to help create a plan of action for each focus area.

# OVERVIEW

Is Hinton a great place to live? In order to answer that question, one must look at the quality of life of residents within the community. Cost of living, economic opportunities, recreation, education, transportation, and arts and culture are all essential for a community's well-being. The comprehensive plan reviews each of these elements to determine how the city can improve and continue to provide the best amenities and services to its residents. Trends in population and age were also considered. According to the U.S. Census, the child-rearing age cohort (ages 35-54) declined in the city over the past ten years, while the pre-retirement age cohort (ages 55-64) increased. These numbers indicate that the population in Hinton is getting older. An older population requires different types of community services, such as public transportation, medical facilities, and increased financial support from family or government resources.

## *Transportation Overview*

The City of Hinton is located approximately ten (10) miles from Interstate 64. The main roads through the city are state maintained roads. As shown on **Map 2: Transportation Network**, State Route 20 is the major roadway that travels through the city and

connects Hinton to Interstate 64 in the north and Athens in the south. State Route 20 receives a fair amount of traffic in Hinton, with the city being the county seat and center of commerce in Summers County. Average daily traffic (ADT) counts range from 1,700 to 2,500 cars per day. Other state routes in the city include State Route 107 (ADT of approximately 7,500) and State Route 3 (ADT of approximately 5,300). The City recently paved local streets in downtown and Bellepoint.

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The City of Beckley is approximately 40 minutes away, the City of Princeton 45 minutes, and the City of Lewisburg is 50 minutes.

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No special routes or lanes exist for bicyclists. Although the Department of Highways installed Share the Road signs, not many people use bikes in the city.

The New River Parkway is a scenic byway that will serve Hinton once completed (Bluefield Daily Telegraph, 2014). The parkway consists of three segments that will run along the New River in both Summers and Raleigh Counties and will connect the City of Hinton with



Interstate 64. The first segment of 1.3 miles has been built beginning at State Road 20 near Hinton along River Road and continuing north. The second segment is now complete and connects Hinton with Sandstone Falls. Construction on the third segment will begin in 2021 and will connect Sandstone Falls to Interstate 64 via bridge. Potential plans exist to extend the parkway south to connect Hinton with the City of Princeton. At this time there are no intermodal transportation options for the city.



The Bluestone Dam impounds the New River, creating Bluestone Lake. The Greenbrier River meets the New River above the dam. Commercial boating does not occur on either rivers, but pleasure boating, fishing, and rafting are popular activities. No designated water trails exist in the city. There is no port within city limits. However, boat launches at Bellepoint Crossing near the Bluestone Dam and Bateau Beach provide river access between the Veterans Memorial Bridge and the Greenbrier Bellepoint Bridge. The City recently applied for a grant to improve the design of the Bateau Beach boat launch ramp. Possible uses for the area include a picnic shelter, restrooms, and proper boat launching facilities.



Amtrak's Cardinal line serves the City of Hinton on Sunday, Wednesday, and Friday each week. Passengers can reach the following destinations from Hinton: Chicago, Indianapolis, Cincinnati, Charlottesville, Va., Washington D.C., Baltimore, Philadelphia, and New York City. In addition, the train stops in Huntington, Charleston, Montgomery, Thurmond, Prince, Alderson, and White Sulphur Springs. The outside and lobby of the Hinton Train Depot has



been renovated. There is a need to renovate the rest of the building. The vacant portions of the train depot could be utilized as offices, restaurant space, or a children's museum. Additional parking is needed as there are only 3 parking spaces currently. Amtrak is in the process of constructing six additional spaces. However, there is still no long term parking for Amtrak customers.

CSX uses the railroad to haul freight, and freight trains travel through the city daily. Summers County High School is located between the river and train tracks which causes concerns with residents because if a train derailment or other issue were to occur while school is in session, students may not be able to evacuate school property safely. Evacuation plans have been discussed but no plan has been developed.

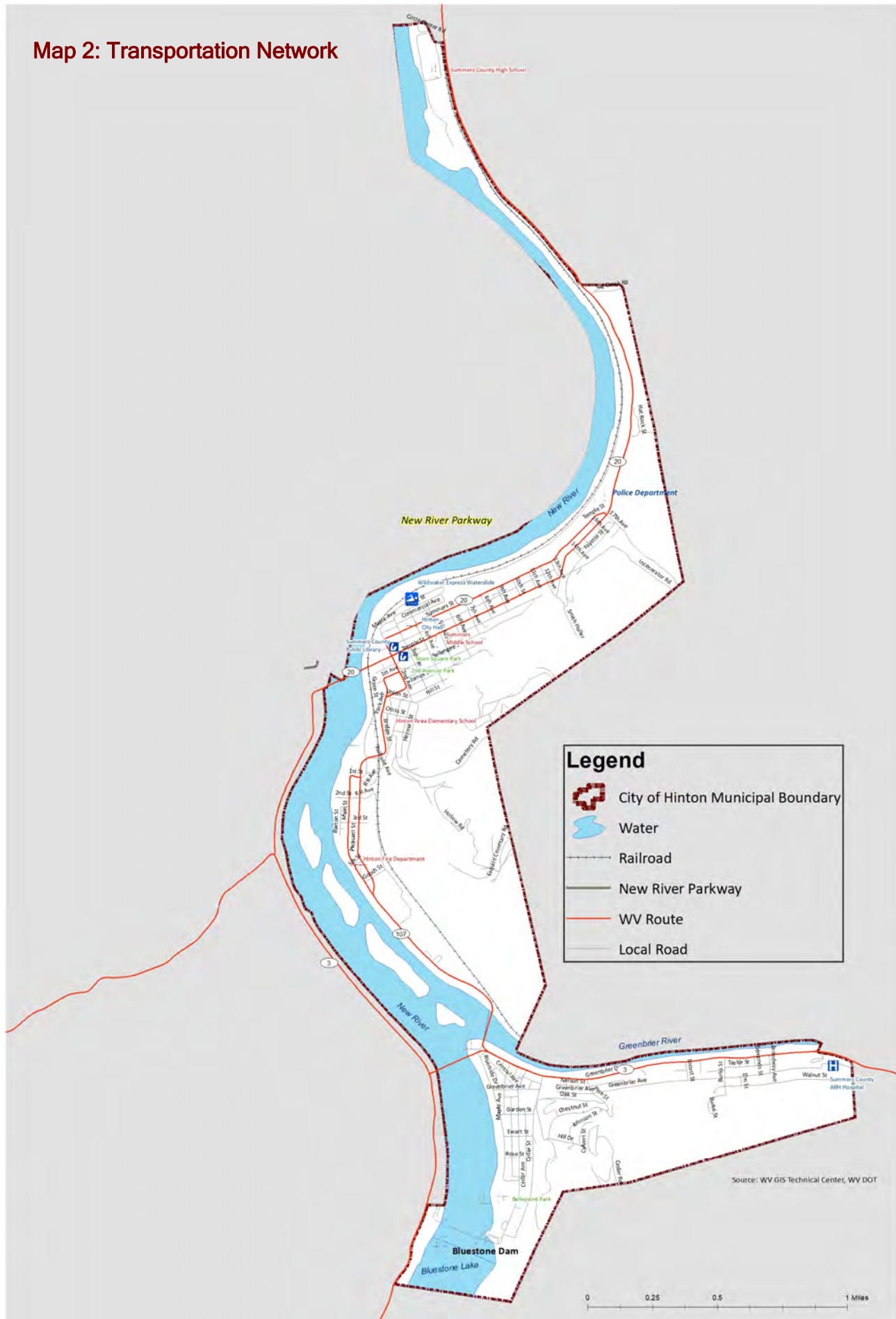

The lack of public transportation in Hinton also concerns local elected officials and residents. There is a need for a local taxi service. The city should also consider a partnership with Summers County to develop a regional public transportation system.

The nearest airport to the City of Hinton is the Greenbrier Valley Airport in Lewisburg.

### Complete paving projects throughout the city

Roads within city limits are maintained by the public works department, which consists of a crew of nine full-time employees. The public works department is responsible for maintaining 26 miles of roads and pave streets based on available funds. In 2019, no local streets were paved due to lack of funding. Typically, the City can only afford to pave one or two streets per year. In the future, the City should budget for paving of roads that are determined to be in particularly bad condition.

### Develop a sidewalk plan to help prioritize sidewalk repairs and construction

Sidewalk maintenance is the responsibility of the property owner, but in the past, the City has applied for grants to repair and/or construct new sidewalks. Overall, residents would like to see Hinton become a more walkable community. Local elected officials, planning commission members, and the public have listed several areas in need of sidewalks. Residents feel that this can be accomplished by constructing new sidewalks in specific areas and repairing existing sidewalks.

Development of a sidewalk plan would facilitate the process. Sidewalk concerns should be mapped to determine what areas of the city need the most improvement. Sidewalks that lead to schools, parks, and businesses should be a high priority. Two areas identified by

the Planning Commission as a high priority are shown on

### **Provide additional parking lots in downtown**

The City provides free on-street parking. A parking lot also exists next to the Hinton Railroad Museum and city hall. Parking forms a concern during the week as insufficient parking exists for Hinton Elementary School and the Summers County Courthouse.

### **Provide additional parking at the Amtrak Station**

The City should work with Amtrak to determine the feasibility of adding additional spaces, especially long-term parking spaces. The City should look at vacant lots near the train station to determine if they could be used to construct a parking lot.

### **Explore opportunities to provide public transportation**

The City should work with the County to determine the feasibility of starting a regional public transportation system. The City should also work with local businesses and nonprofits to start a local taxi service.

### **Install a unified signage system throughout the city**

Residents and business owners identified lack of signage as a challenge. The directional signage in Hinton is inconsistent and lacks a cohesive theme. The City should first determine an appropriate color scheme and design for signs. In the past, the City explored the purchase of professionally designed signs; however, the cost was prohibitive. The City should explore whether local artists would be able to create signs at a lower cost.

## Community Services Overview

According to city residents, public safety is a vital government service. If residents do not feel safe in their community, decreased quality of life is inevitable. An online survey was published during the comprehensive plan process, asking residents what is the most important service that the City of Hinton provides its residents. Police and fire protection formed the top answers. The City of Hinton Police Department consists of seven (7) full-time police officers. The City of Hinton Volunteer Fire Department consists of four (4) paid firefighters and 25 volunteer firefighters. A new fire station was built five years ago (The Register-Herald, 2009).

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Of online survey respondents, 65 percent are satisfied with the police department services and 89 percent are satisfied with fire department services

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The City of Hinton is well served with utilities, essential utilities and equipment, and infrastructure.

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Summers County Appalachian Regional Healthcare Hospital is located in Hinton and has 25 beds, 40 doctors, and 123 employees. The hospital provides an emergency room and a home care store and offers a variety of surgical procedures, a senior care program, rehabilitation services, and imaging. The hospital also operates the Summers County Family Care Clinic, which specializes in family medicine.

The Summers County School District serves children in Hinton. Three elementary schools lie within the county, one of which is located in Hinton and serves children in pre-kindergarten through grade five. Summers Middle School is the only middle school in the county and is located in Hinton. In 2020, the middle school in downtown Hinton was permanently closed due to unsafe conditions and the middle school students were transferred to the high school. The Summers County Board of Education is considering an addition onto the high school with more classroom space and an additional gymnasium as funding allows.

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According to the US Census, over the past ten years school age cohorts (ages 5-19) are stagnant and make up the least amount of age cohorts in the city.

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Approximately 340 students attend the middle school from grades six through eight. Programs at the middle school include 4-H, band, Bible club, basketball, cheerleading, football, golf, natural helpers, National Junior Honor Society, student government, and yearbook. Summers County High School is also located in Hinton and serves students in grades nine through twelve. Programs at the high school include basketball, baseball, softball, football, golf, cheerleading, band, FFA, and volleyball.

The Summers County Library is located in Hinton. The library consists of five full-time staff and one part-time staff. Many of the programs at the library are geared toward children, but the library is working on diversifying its programming.

There has been an increase in the pre-school (Under age 5) and childbearing age cohorts (ages 25-34) in Hinton, which could indicate that there will be a slight increase in young people in Hinton in the next several years. School age children require more school and recreational facilities.

### Continue to provide resources to the police department

The police department needs to replace aging police vehicles. Residents expressed concern about recently increased drug activity and desire additional police protection, perhaps even foot patrol. The City of Hinton Police Department has two officers on duty at a time. The City has experienced difficulty with turnover of police officers because they tend to work for the City for a short time, only to leave for a higher-paying job.

Replacement of police vehicles and additional police should be considered in future city budget proposals. The City should also consider increasing patrols throughout the city to address increased drug activity.

### Develop community-oriented policing

At this time, the City of Hinton Police Department runs no community programs. Hinton residents are concerned about increased crime and drug usage. Community-oriented policing brings police and community together by working jointly to address and identify crime. The city police department has already created a Facebook page to increase interaction with citizens and provide important information on public safety (Hinton Police



Department Facebook, 2020). Other ways to involve the public include: email alerts, neighborhood watch meetings, a text messaging system, press releases, police academy, and classes at the high school.

### **Partner with Summers County to provide a school resource officer for schools**

The county needs a full-time school resource officer. A partnership should be explored between the city, county, and Board of Education to employ a school resource officer. A school resource officer educates students on safety, law, and crime prevention. The officer also provides protection to students, teachers, and staff.

### **Continue to provide resources to the fire department**

Greenbrier Drive, Possum Hollow, Walnut Street, and Esquire Cemetery lack adequate water supply. This lack of water causes concern for the fire department in a fire event. Additional fire hydrants are needed in Bellepoint. The fire department has also stated a need for additional paid firemen.

Replacement of aging fire vehicles, the need for additional fireman, and water supply should be considered in future city budget proposals and when developing grant proposals.

### **Prepare for emergencies**

The City should provide information on its website regarding emergency shelter locations and alert methods. The City should consider the use of an email list to send updates to residents regarding emergencies, severe weather, chemical leaks, natural disasters, street closures,

water main breaks, boil water advisories, and public safety advisories. The City should also explore the use of a text messaging alert system.

An emergency generator is needed so that the fire station could be used as an emergency shelter.

### **Provide water and sewer infrastructure for all residents**

The City of Hinton is well served by public water and sewer. The sanitary sewer system covers 18 square miles and covers the City of Hinton, Bellepoint, Avis, Barksdale, Brooks, and Brooklyn. Areas to be potentially added in the future for service include Willow Wood, Beach Run, and Madams Creek. The system needs valves to control air on an aeration basin. Other concerns include inflow, infiltration, and repairing and installing a second ultraviolet light bank. West Virginia American Water provides public water in most of the city. Areas of the city not covered by public water include homes along Cemetery Road and Possum Hollow Road.

The City should work with West Virginia American Water to install public water access in high-need areas. The City should also budget for additional extensions of the sewer system in underserved areas. Sewer equipment should also be budgeted and prioritized.

## Recreation Overview

The City of Hinton is surrounded by an abundance of recreation, as shown on **Map 1: Location Map**. From city parks to state parks to even a national park, the City of Hinton does not lack recreation opportunities. City-owned recreation opportunities include the Wildwater Express Waterslide, Bellepoint Park, Town Square Park, and Second Avenue Park.

### Wildwater Express

Waterslide includes a train-shaped swimming pool, kiddie pool, two water slides, concession area, and basketball court.



Facilities at Bellepoint Park include a playground, pavilion with picnic tables, charcoal grills, benches,

picnic tables, swing-set, walking path, basketball court, tennis courts, baseball field with lights, and restrooms. Town Square Park and Second Avenue Park are open space areas that provide locations for events and festivals. The City recently built a stage in Town Square Park for local events.

Bluestone State Park and Pipestem Resort State Park are both located within reasonable driving distances from Hinton. Bluestone State Park is approximately five miles from Hinton and is home to Bluestone Lake. The state park offers camping and cabins. The lake includes public boat launches as well as boat rentals, boat slips, and trailer parking at Bluestone Marina. Eight miles of hiking trails, picnic tables, and an outdoor pool are located at the lake.

The Bluestone Wildlife Management Area borders Bluestone Lake and is located approximately 30 minutes from Hinton. The Area offers hunting, boating, fishing, primitive camping, hiking trails, and picnic sites. Pipestem Resort State Park is approximately 20 minutes from Hinton and offers numerous recreation activities. Activities include a tramway, zipline tours, guided fishing tours, rock climbing, mountain biking and hiking trails, fishing, adventure lake and splash park, indoor pool, 9- and 18-hole golf courses, driving range, mini golf course, paddleboats, canoeing and kayaking on Long Branch Lake, tennis courts, horseback riding, and whitewater rafting. In the winter, sledding and cross-country skiing are popular activities. Overnight facilities include cabins, two lodges, and campgrounds. The park also offers shopping and dining options.

Hinton is also located minutes from New River Gorge National River, which consists of over 70,000 acres of land along the New River. The New River travels through three states (North Carolina, Virginia, and West Virginia). The river starts in North Carolina and ends in Gauley Bridge, West Virginia, where it joins the Gauley River to form the Kanawha River. The Sandstone Visitors Center is located approximately ten miles from Hinton and educates visitors on the history of the New River.

Sandstone Falls is the largest waterfall on the New River. The river drops 10 to 25 feet at the falls. Visitors can view the falls on a series of boardwalks. There are two overlooks on State Route 20. Sandstone Falls Overlook provides views of the falls and Brooks Overlook provides views of Brooks Island, which is a bald eagle nesting site (National Park Service, 2018).



Through the Community Captains program offered by Active Southern West Virginia, an organized one-mile group walk meets every Tuesday morning at Bellepoint Park. Active Southern West Virginia has also partnered with the Summers County Public Library to offer a free 5K runner program. The Summers Running Club plans to begin meeting weekly and offer training for 5K races in the future.

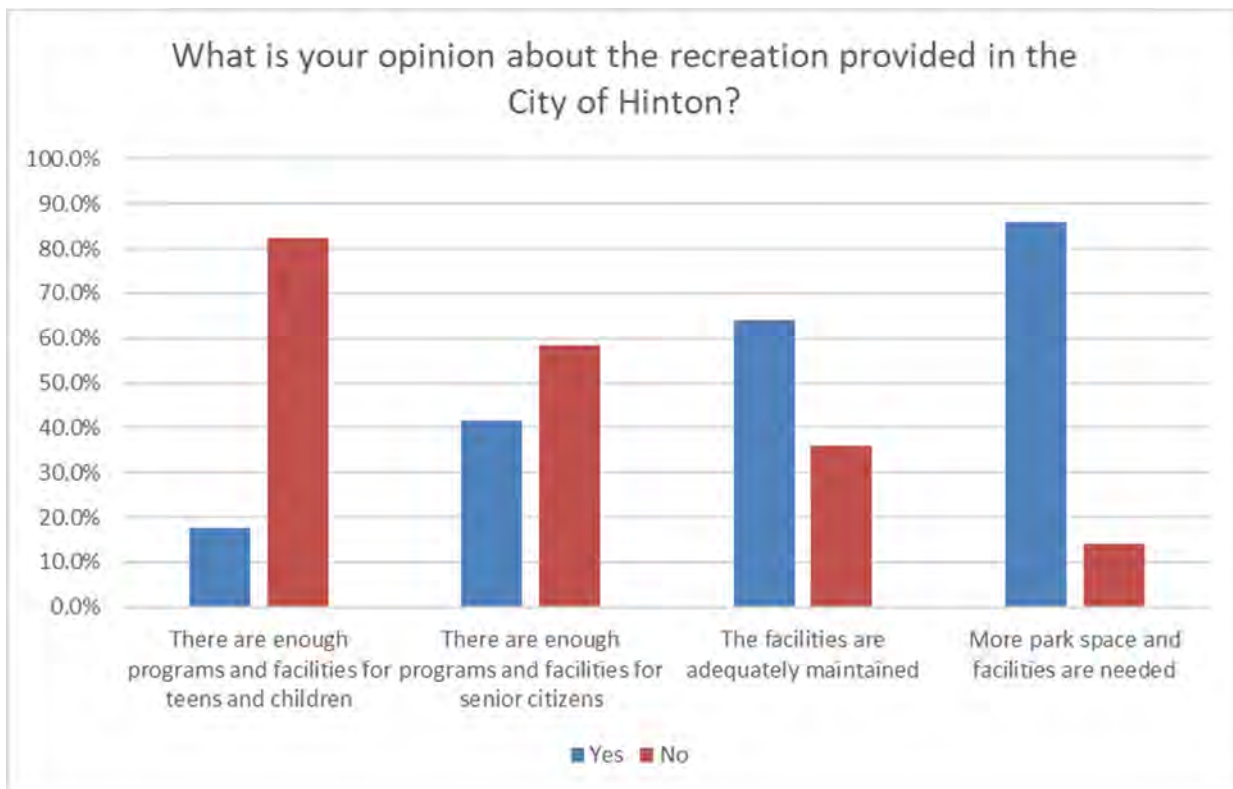
### Explore the feasibility of providing additional recreation facilities

While there are numerous recreational attractions in the city and surrounding area, residents still desire additional recreational opportunities. Approximately 82% of survey respondents feel



that there are not enough programs and facilities for teens and children. Residents also feel that there are not enough programs and facilities for senior citizens and that more park space and facilities are needed. Overall, residents desire more indoor recreation, access to the river, and family-oriented events.

The City should consider providing space for indoor recreation for residents. An indoor recreation facility could be as simple as a gym that residents could use to play basketball, soccer, and other types of games. The gym could also be rented out for events and parties.



Accessibility to existing recreation is an issue as most recreation that the city offers is located in the Bellepoint neighborhood. Bellepoint is not easily accessible to many residents as the park is a far walk for those without vehicles. Residents specifically expressed desire for a park in the West End neighborhood. A possible location for a park in the West End neighborhood is shown on **Map 6: Future Land Use**.

The City should also consider adding additional recreational amenities in Town Square Park. The City could install backyard games such as corn hole boards, giant blocks, horseshoes, and shuffleboard. The City could also host games in the park such as tag, frisbee, and kickball. The New River Gorge

### Case Studies: Community Centers

#### *City of Elkins*

In 2014, the City of Elkins purchased the former Elkins National Guard Armory and repurposed the building into the Phil Gainer Community Center. The community center includes a multi-purpose room with basketball, volleyball, tennis, and pickleball courts. The gym can also be used for baseball and soccer. The community center also has a batting cage, stage area, kitchen, and meeting room. The facility is available for event rentals.

#### *Pocahontas County*

The Pocahontas Community Wellness Center is located in the Town of Marlinton next to Marlinton Elementary School and Greenbrier River Trail. The wellness center includes a gymnasium, fitness room, racquetball court, and multi-purpose rooms. The center also offers group activities such as aerobics, crafts, and after-school activities for children.

Regional Development Authority and the City of Hinton recently received a grant of \$442,320 from the West Virginia Department of Environmental Protection to clean up property beside the Ice Plant that may be used for a future amphitheater. Over 71 percent of residents stated they would use an amphitheater.

### **Provide recreational programs**

Organized sports activities for children include Summers County Youth Football (varsity, peewee, and flag) and Cheer, Hinton Little League (boys and girls baseball and softball, ages 4 to 16), and Hinton Youth League Girls Basketball.

The City should consider a part-time position that would provide recreational programming for all ages. Youth programming could include arts and crafts, outdoor adventure, technology, hiking and bicycling. Adult programming could include sports, health/fitness, and educational programming (for example: CPR and art). Senior programming could include senior fitness, book club, excursions and card games.

Residents have also expressed interest in the formation of a youth soccer league. This interest should be explored with the other sports organizations to determine whether it is a feasible program for Hinton and the surrounding area.

### **Consider partnering with nearby facilities to provide additional recreational opportunities**

Bluestone and Pipestem Resort State Parks offer a variety of recreational opportunities. However, the parks are not within walking distance of the city, which poses a hardship to those without a vehicle. The City should explore a bus or shuttle to and from Hinton to either or

both

parks.

A

minimum ridership would be required for the bus to be provided. Initially, the bus could run on a weekly basis to assess interest from residents.

### Promote Bluestone State Park and Pipestem State Park to residents and visitors by hosting an annual Summers County Park Appreciation Day

The City of Hinton should partner with both Bluestone State Park and Pipestem State Park to promote the state parks to residents and visitors by:

- Hosting an annual Summers County State Park Appreciation Day
- Planning and promoting other events at Bluestone State Park and Pipestem State Park
- Encourage and facilitate school field trips and senior citizen trips to Bluestone State Park and Pipestem State Park

### Explore the feasibility of installing a splash pad at the Wildwater Express Waterslide

Some local elected officials have expressed interest in installing a splash pad at the pool.

Splash pads are a wonderful addition to a community and can attract tourists and visitors from surrounding areas. Splash pads are inexpensive to maintain and can be elaborate or simple depending on the needs of the community. Water features are incorporated into the splash pad that can shower, mist, and shoot streams of water with zero water depth. Water is treated and recirculated through a filtration system.

## Case Studies: Community Centers

### Mill Race Park, Parsons, WV

The Splash Park Zone at Mill Race Park in Parsons, is a 3,000 square foot pirate ship-themed splash park. Improvements to Mill Race Park include the addition of a bucket dump, paving the parking lot, and installation of a new ice-skating rink.

### Palatine Park: City of Fairmont

In 2014, the City of Fairmont installed a splash pad in Palatine Park along the Monongahela River. The splash pad is free for visitors. Palatine Park also includes river access for fishing and boating and a pavilion for events and concerts. In the winter, the splash pad is converted into an ice-skating rink and free skates are provided.







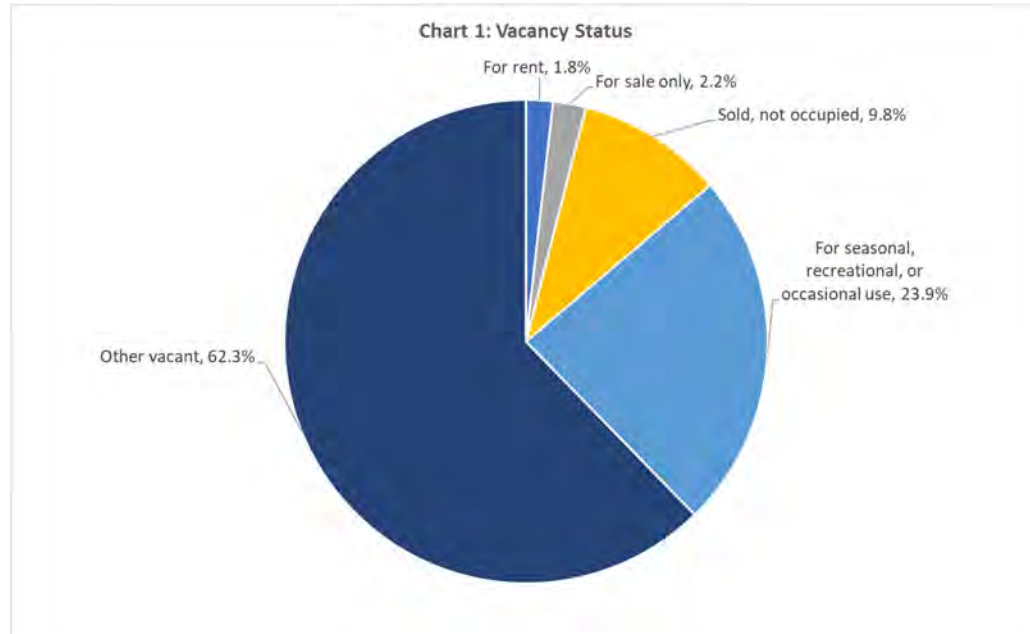
## Focus Area 2: Enhance the appearance of the City



# OVERVIEW

The presence of numerous abandoned and dilapidated buildings throughout the city is a major concern of residents. Data from the U.S. Census Bureau was utilized to better understand housing issues in Hinton. According to the 2018 American Community Survey, 18.3% of housing units in Hinton are vacant.

This rate is higher than West Virginia (17.8%) and the United States (12.3%). A high vacancy rate can indicate that economic circumstances, housing type, and condition are such that many people



choose not to live within the municipal boundaries or move elsewhere. A high vacancy rate can also negatively affect residential neighborhoods. The majority of vacant homes fall into the category of “all other vacants” as illustrated on **Chart 1: Vacancy Status**. According to the US Census bureau the term “all other vacants” refers to units held vacant for personal reasons by the owner. Common reasons include:

- No one lives in the unit and the owner is making repairs
- Owner does not want to rent or sell
- Owner using the home for storage
- Owner is elderly and living in a nursing home or elsewhere

Seasonal homes comprise the next highest level of vacancies as Hinton is close to many recreational attractions.

In addition, the fact that 51% of housing in Hinton is owner occupied and 49% is renter occupied causes concern. The number of renters in the city has increased over the past several years while the number of people owning their own home has decreased.

The City of Hinton is working to address concerns of residents regarding abandoned and dilapidated buildings. Recently the city was accepted into West Virginia University's BAD Buildings Program, which provides technical assistance and tools to address brownfields and abandoned and dilapidated buildings. The program helps communities identify, prioritize, and redevelop buildings of concern. As part of the program, the City will develop an inventory of site information and ranked list of criteria to create a redevelopment plan to address high-priority sites. The inventory will be useful to determine the scope of the problem and prepare an action plan to move forward.

The City adopted the 2010 International Property Maintenance Code (IPMC), which provides regulations for the repair and maintenance of the exterior of property and structures. Some general requirements in the IPMC cover grass and weeds, cracked and broken windows, pest elimination, garbage, graffiti, and inoperable or abandoned vehicles.

In February of 2021 the City enacted West Virginia Code Section 8-12-16, which allows municipalities to address structures, dwellings, or buildings that are unsafe, unsanitary, dangerous, or detrimental to the public safety or welfare. Procedures set out in the provisions ensure that property owners receive due process. Although similar to the building code in some ways, Section 8-12-16 contains additional authority not included in the building code.

The City passed nuisance ordinances in place to protect public health. The ordinances regulate boarding or lodging houses; odor; junk automobiles and machinery; pipes, tanks, gutters, and cans; and operation of engines, furnaces, or boilers. In 2016, the City adopted an ordinance creating a vacant property registry requiring vacant property owners to register their property with the City, which assesses a fee for each year the building is vacant. To date, the City has not enforced the ordinance.

Residents expressed concern about the overall appearance of the city. Survey respondents were asked how the city should be beautified and litter removal was the top concern. In April 2019, the City hosted a community-wide cleanup. The City's street crew also removed several dumpsters of trash from city limits. In October of 2020, the City hosted a Litter Sweep where volunteers

picked up and hauled trash. The City also hosted a city-wide clean-up in October. The city was broken into 6 quadrants. Each quadrant was asked to have their larger household items outside to be picked up on their designated day. In preparation of the cleanup, the Hinton Police notified homeowners that are in violation of City trash codes so that they will be given the opportunity to get rid of the trash during the pick-up or be fined.

Hinton Full Steam Ahead is a local group of volunteers that have worked with the West Virginia Community Development Hub's Communities of Achievement Program to make Hinton a regional hub promoting arts, culture, and active entertainment for all ages, while also highlighting the city's railroad history (WV Community Development Hub, 2019). The Hinton Full Steam Ahead group has worked on many beautification projects throughout the city, including coordination to complete the mural on 3rd Avenue and the cleanup of Lincoln School and the Hardwoods Building.

The City has worked on various beautification efforts throughout the years, including landscaping, construction of a new stage, and installation of flower baskets and flags on light poles and bridges.

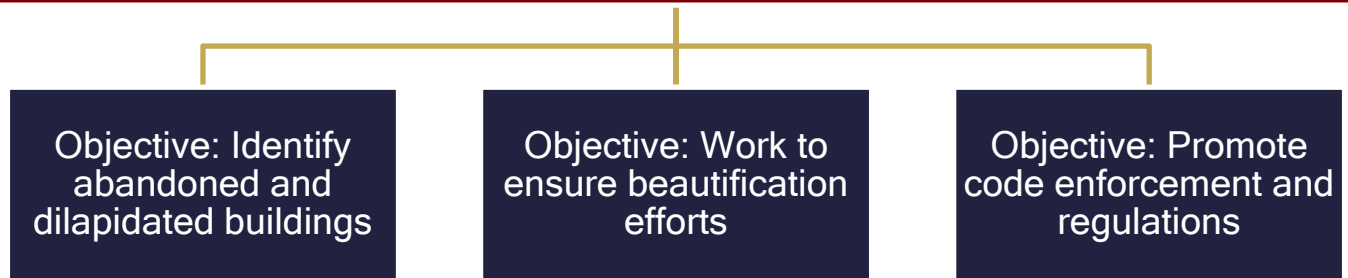

## Goal 2: Enhance the appearance of the city by improving housing and building quality.



### Increase code enforcement efforts

An online survey completed for the comprehensive plan indicated that 92% of survey respondents support increased code enforcement to address abandoned and dilapidated buildings. The City recently hired a code enforcement officer on an as-needed basis to enforce current regulations. The City should develop press releases to inform the public about the new position and provide information on how regulations will be enforced.

### Enforce the vacant property registry

The City's vacant property registry ordinance was enacted in 2016 but has not yet been enforced due to a lack of staff. With the recent hiring of a code enforcement officer, enforcement of the ordinance should be a priority.

### Case Study: City of Fairmont Vacant Property Registration

The City of Fairmont Vacant Property Registration Program encourages property owners to register their vacant building after the building has been vacant for 180 days. If the property is reoccupied after 180 days, the property owner is eligible for a maximum of 100% business & occupancy (B&O) tax credits on rent and royalties for five years. The code enforcement officer inspects buildings free of charge on an annual basis.

### Apply for home rule status

Another tool municipalities can use to deal with abandoned and dilapidated buildings is the Municipal Home Rule Program, which allows municipalities to experiment with ideas currently not permitted via state code. The City should consider applying to participate in the Home Rule Program to address specific problems relating to abandoned and dilapidated buildings and other issues. If the city becomes a home rule municipality, local elected officials should consider the use of on-site citations, which would allow city officials to issue citations to property owners for sanitation and nuisance violations without the need for court enforcement.

### Extend beautification efforts

Beautification efforts should be extended to the West End and Avis neighborhoods, as shown on **Map 6: Future Land Use**. Beautification should include installation of lamp posts, flower baskets, and tree boxes.

Local elected officials have also expressed a desire to add more public art, such as sculptures and town symbols, throughout the community.

### **Case Study: Public Art in Winchester and Blacksburg, Va.**

In Winchester, Va., apple sculptures are sold to and decorated by community businesses, then installed downtown. Winchester claims to be the apple capital of the world and hosts the annual Shenandoah Apple Blossom Festival.

In Blacksburg, Va., home to Virginia Tech, a public-private partnership created the Gobble de Art project, which places Hokie Bird statues all around Blacksburg.



### **Develop community gardens on vacant lots**

Residents stated that they would like community gardens planted on vacant lots to help improve the city's image and provide food and gardening opportunities for residents. City-owned vacant lots would be an ideal location to start a community garden. For privately-owned vacant lots, the property owner would need to grant permission. The City should consider providing start-up materials and assistance to local groups willing to sponsor and maintain a garden. The city owns several vacant lots that could be a potential area for a community garden.

### **Continue to host annual city-wide clean-up events**

The City should continue hosting organized clean-up events in both spring and fall. Clean-up of litter on roads and riverbanks should be completed. The event should also include a curbside clean-up where residents can place large and bulky items not suitable for regular garbage pickup. The City should consider coordinating volunteer groups to help elderly and low-income residents clean up their yards.



### **Sponsor a monthly home and yard contest**

The City should consider sponsoring a monthly home and yard contest to incentivize residents to clean up their property. A prize could be given to a resident with the most improved home and yard. Local businesses could sponsor the contest by donating prizes, such as free meals to local restaurants and gift certificates to local stores.

### **Encourage remote workers to live in Hinton**

West Virginia University was recently awarded funding from Intuit executive Brad Smith and his wife, Alys, for a remote worker program to fuel entrepreneurial and innovative thinking by bringing new talent to West Virginia (Brad and Alys Smith Outdoor Economic Development Collaborative, 2021). The program has since been named the Brad and Alys Smith Outdoor Economic Development Collaborative. The collaborative's remote program will include benefits such as financial incentives, free co-working space, free and subsidized outdoor trips and activities, professional development, and networking events (Brad and Alys Smith Outdoor Economic Development Collaborative, 2021).

Hinton local officials would like to capitalize on this program by encouraging remote workers to choose Hinton as their home. However, newer housing and housing for middle-income individuals is needed to attract younger people and families to Hinton. The city would like to work with private developers to build new housing, possibly using the Tax Increment Financing (TIF) program.

## Case Study: Beautification Contests

The City of Weston hosts an annual clean-up week, during which the Street Department picks up items that residents want to throw away. Community groups also form teams to clean up the city.

In the City of Elkins, a Make it Shine contest rewards residents \$300 for cleaning and improving property within city limits. Participants must submit before and after photos. Prizes are also available for runners-up. During the Make it Shine contest, residents painted murals on dumpsters throughout the city.



### Consider adopting the West Virginia Building Code

The building code is one of the most effective means of addressing abandoned and dilapidated buildings. Regular inspections of buildings can prevent dilapidation in the first place. The building code also provides remedies for repair and demolition. Approximately 78% of survey respondents supported the adoption of the West Virginia State Building Code. Local elected officials have recently discussed enacting the building code. However, the cost of enforcement is a barrier, as a certified code enforcement officer would need to be hired. The City is currently exploring options on the best way to adopt and administer the building code.



# \$ Focus Area 3: Economic Development

# OVERVIEW

A thorough analysis is needed to determine the best economic opportunities for the City of Hinton. This section of the comprehensive plan explores the strengths, weaknesses, and opportunities of the local economy in Hinton. This information was gathered from input from the City of Hinton Planning Commission, open houses, and the online survey conducted during the comprehensive plan process.

The City's most valuable asset is its scenic and beautiful location in the New River Gorge. Tourism is a key focus for future economic growth in the city. Visitors can enjoy the great outdoors in the surrounding region and visit Hinton for retail and restaurant needs. However, increased marketing and promotion is needed, as Hinton is located ten miles from the nearest interstate. The completion of the New River Parkway will help attract visitors into Hinton. However, visitors may bypass Hinton altogether as the parkway does not directly travel through Hinton.

Bluestone and Pipestem State Resort Parks are within a reasonable driving distance from the City of Hinton. Wildwater Express, the city's swimming pool, is a regional attraction, with 11,000 people using the pool in 2018 and 8,100 in 2019.

The Bluestone Dam, built in 1952, also provides economic growth to the city. The dam is located on the New River and provides flood control for the New and Kanawha River Valleys. Over half

of the water that travels through Charleston comes through the Bluestone Dam (U.S. Army Corp. of Engineers, 2019). The dam impounds the New River, creating the 11-mile long Bluestone Lake. The dam is 165 feet high and half of a mile long. Bluestone Lake provides recreation and fishing opportunities for the City of Hinton, the surrounding region, and visitors. In recent years, the dam has been under construction to reduce the risk of a breach. The project has five phases, with the fifth phase having begun in 2019. The fifth phase is for basin improvements and is projected to be completed in 2027, at a cost of more than \$200 million (West Virginia MetroNews Network, 2019). The lake brings in tourism dollars, and ongoing dam construction provides B&O taxes to the City of Hinton.

The downtown business district is a strength for Hinton. Hinton has a vibrant historic downtown district that is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. Several projects in downtown Hinton have been completed utilizing federal historic preservation tax credits available due to its historic status. Hinton is the county seat for Summers County, with the Summers County Courthouse, Summers County Board of Education, and other county government offices located in Hinton. Summers County is also a designated opportunity zone, which provides federal tax incentives for developers willing to invest in the area (West Virginia Development Office Opportunity Zones, 2020).

The Explore Summers County Visitors Center is located in downtown Hinton and provides information to visitors on local restaurants, shopping, and lodging. The visitors center is operated by the New River Gateway Convention and Visitors Bureau, which promotes the City of Hinton and Summers County. The mission of the CVB is to strengthen the community by advancing economic growth through tourism. The CVB promotes all festivals and events in the city and county using their website, social media,

and printed brochures. Future plans include continuing to improve marketing, working with other organizations, and partnering with the City on advertisements. A lack of parking is a concern at the visitors center.

Downtown has seen revitalization in the past few years with a few new businesses opening. Downtown businesses include restaurants, a movie theater, museums, retail shops, and personal services. The Ritz Theater was restored in 2009 and provides live entertainment and weekend movies. The theater is also available to rent for parties, events, and conferences. A need exists for a local chamber of commerce to help promote local businesses.

PracticeLink has been headquartered in Hinton since 1999. PracticeLink is a call center that connects job-seeking physicians and practitioners with health systems, hospitals, medical groups, and private practices (PracticeLink, 2019). The City of Hinton also serves as home to three banks; City National Bank, First Community Bank, and Summit Community Bank.

The Hinton Technology Center, opened in 2006, is located downtown and includes retail, medical offices, a daycare, and a city-owned fitness center. The technology center is owned by the

city and is difficult to maintain and the top floor is currently vacant. There is a need for additional tenants in the building, as current rents received fail to cover the operating utility costs.

Several organizations have been involved in revitalization efforts. For example, MountainPlex Properties, which was founded in 2007, has led the preservation and revitalization of several buildings and businesses in downtown Hinton.

The Hinton Area Foundation is a nonprofit group that funds projects and scholarships in Hinton and Summers County. Funding comes from gifts and contributions to the foundation. Grants available through the foundation include the Community Impact Grant, Making a Difference Community Improvement Project Grant, and the Learning Innovation Mini-Grant. The foundation has 42 different scholarship funds with different criteria.

The Hinton Hope Foundation sponsors three community reinvestment projects in the county each year. The foundation hosts Hinton's Got Talent, a ginseng cultivation project, Summers County Cookery, and Youth Leaders of Summers County. Hinton Full Steam Ahead is an organization working on several economic development projects, include developing weekly collaboration conversations for community leaders, stabilization of the Hardwoods Building, and hosting a developer tour to showcase available real estate in the city.

Numerous events and festivals in Hinton satisfy the cultural, social, and community needs of residents. The events and festivals also attract visitors to downtown. In 2017, in order to promote the city and its businesses, 2<sup>nd</sup> Saturdays were established. Beginning in May, a series of musical events, food, and other activities are held during the second Saturday every month until September. The 2<sup>nd</sup>

Saturdays organization has expanded its efforts to include an indoor flea market during the



winter months. In 2019, the Festival of Rivers was held in conjunction with 2<sup>nd</sup> Saturdays in August. The festival includes live music, vendors, artists, a car show, and food.

The biggest festival is Hinton Railroad Days, which attracts thousands of visitors to the city in October. Streets in Hinton are closed to traffic and filled with vendors selling crafts, art, and food. Live music plays throughout the weekend. For over 50 years, the Collis P. Huntington Railroad Historical Society has sponsored the New River Train, an excursion train running weekends throughout the month of October, to Hinton during Railroad Days. However, in 2019, the Historical Society cancelled its sponsored trip due to changed Amtrak policies making it cost prohibitive to continue running the train (West Virginia MetroNews Network, 2019). Rail Excursion Management Company, a private company, stepped in to run the train instead. The express ran for three days in privately-owned luxury rail cars with breakfast and dinner served. Passengers had three hours to enjoy the festival in Hinton. According to the company's website, the train transported over 2,500 guests to Hinton from Huntington and Charleston over the three days.

Other festivals in Hinton include the West Virginia Water Festival, which is a weeklong event held in the summer. The West Virginia Water Festival includes contests, dog show, car show, quilt show, arts and crafts, fishing tournament, fireman's parade, rubber ducky race, pancake breakfast, fireworks, grand parade concerts, and street dance.

A Hinton Hometown Christmas is an annual event that kicks off the Saturday after Thanksgiving with Small Business Saturday. Other events throughout the month of December include caroling, breakfast or cookies with Santa, Christmas Parade, Christmas Bazaar, City of Hinton tree lighting, and musical events.

While downtown Hinton is the center of the city, there are many other businesses located in neighborhoods of Avis and Bellepoint. The presence of Summers County Appalachian Regional Healthcare Hospital attracts medical professionals and visitors into the city. The lack of workforce available in the community forms a concern. In addition, there has not been a shopping center since MagicMart closed in 2018. The city also lacks a hotel.

Though Hinton is remote, the city is connected with broadband access. However, certain areas of the city experience connectivity issues.

An opportunity exists to attract conferences into Hinton with the presence of three event centers: the Ritz Theater, Freight Depot, and McCreery House.

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Of online survey respondents, approximately 43 percent said their internet service is good, approximately 31 percent said their internet is good sometimes, and 26 percent said their internet is not good.

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## Goal 3: Strengthen economic development by attracting and supporting new businesses and retail.

Objective: Retain existing business

Objective: Bring more people in to visit the city

Objective: Provide the resources businesses need to flourish

### Increase marketing and promotion of local businesses and attractions

The City of Hinton is considered a hidden gem in southern West Virginia. Many people in West Virginia and in other parts of the country are not aware of all that Hinton has to offer. The New River Gateway Convention and Visitors Bureau (CVB) does well in promoting Hinton. Many recreation, attractions, shopping, dining, and lodging opportunities in Hinton are listed on the CVB website. Brochures can be mailed to interested people, but the CVB should consider posting an online copy of the brochure in PDF format. The City of Hinton is the only incorporated municipality in Summers County. A brief description of the city and corresponding map should be included on the website to bring awareness to visitors. In 2019, approximately 2,400 passengers used the Hinton Depot. Signage at the depot is needed to direct people to downtown. Brochures highlighting businesses, restaurants, and attractions in Hinton are also needed inside of the train depot.

Hinton needs marketing at the state and national level. The City's website should include a link to the CVB website, and vice versa. Brochures of city attractions and businesses should be available online. A partnership between the City and CVB should explore media exposure, such as newspaper ads and commercials, in markets outside of West Virginia.



### Market tax credits for historic preservation and designated opportunity zone

The City of Hinton downtown is a designated historic district, which allows property owners to participate in the Historic Rehabilitation Tax Credit program. The City and its Historic Landmarks Commission should continue to publicize the tax credit program and assist property owners in applying for and receiving historic rehabilitation tax credits. Information about the program should be included on the city website.

Property owners have yet to take advantage of the federally designated opportunity zone, which provides tax-deferring benefits on any capital gains received from real estate or business investment in Hinton. The City should include information about the opportunity zone on its website and publicize the information through various media outlets.



### Consider the formation of a local business group to promote city businesses

Businesses in Hinton should consider forming a local business group or partnership to share advice, knowledge, and experience with one another. The group could take the lead in showcasing businesses, organizing events, and promotional activities in Hinton.

### **Case Study: City of Lewisburg Downtown Merchants Association**

The City of Lewisburg has a Downtown Merchants Association that has been very successful. Many of the fairs and festivals in the city have been developed by the Downtown Merchants Association to showcase businesses. At First Friday events, shops, galleries and restaurants remain open later than usual and offer free entertainment, refreshments, special sales, and services. (Source: The Register Herald, 2020)

### **Explore opportunities for the Hinton Technology Center**

The City of Hinton should explore how to use the Hinton Technology Center to reduce costs. One potential opportunity would be to convert the second floor to lodging.

### **Hold additional events to attract visitors**

Events currently held in the city attract thousands of visitors annually. One of the largest festivals in Hinton is Railroad Days. A website was recently created for the event. The website should include information on timing of events and specific vendors that will be at the festival.

While an event is typically held at least monthly in Hinton, there is a need for additional events in the winter. For example, a winter carnival event could include ice skating, sleigh rides, and ice sculptures.

## **Case Study: Events, Festivals, and Carnivals**

### **Fort Ligonier Days**

Fort Ligonier Days is an event held yearly in Ligonier, Pennsylvania. The event website includes maps with vendor and music locations, points of interest, craft areas, first aid locations, bathroom facilities, and parking. (Source: Fort Ligonier Days, 2020)

### **Fire and Ice Carnival**

The City of Elkins, West Virginia, has previously held a winter carnival called Fire and Ice. The carnival included a temporary, portable ice-skating rink and skate rentals, fire juggles, fire breathers, dancers, stilt walkers, live music, and a comedy show.

### **Encourage the expansion of internet and cell phone service**

Residents and business owners have the option of using cable, DSL, and satellite internet services. While most are able to access the Internet, some areas of the city lack service. The City should work with internet service providers to ensure all residents have access to reliable internet service.

The City should work with the West Virginia Legislature to expand internet access to unserved and underserved areas. The City should also work with the Region 1 Planning and

Development Council to implement the Broadband Strategic Plan that was completed for the region.

### **Market Hinton as a destination and venue for conferences**

The City of Hinton has several venues that are ideal for hosting conferences, which is unique for a small city. The Freight Depot is city-owned and should be showcased on the city website. Summers County CVB highlights venues on its website. The City should also provide a link to the CVB website page on area venues.

### **Consider hiring a business specialist**

The city is need of a business specialist to focus on working with merchants, establishing E-commerce, developing and expanding events, and marketing the city to visitors.







## Focus Area 4: Land Use

# OVERVIEW

The City of Hinton is a small municipality with a population density of approximately 1,100 people per square mile. Building intensity is typical of a small town in West Virginia, with average size homes on smaller lots. Most of the land within Hinton is already developed. Most of the city consists of single-family residential uses, as shown on **Map 4: Existing Land Use**. Multi-family residential uses are mainly located downtown and include duplexes and apartments above businesses. Affordable housing units and universally-designed housing that is accessible to persons with disabilities exist in the city, such as Hinton House. Some interest has been expressed in converting the old hospital into low- to middle-income housing, but a project has not come to fruition.

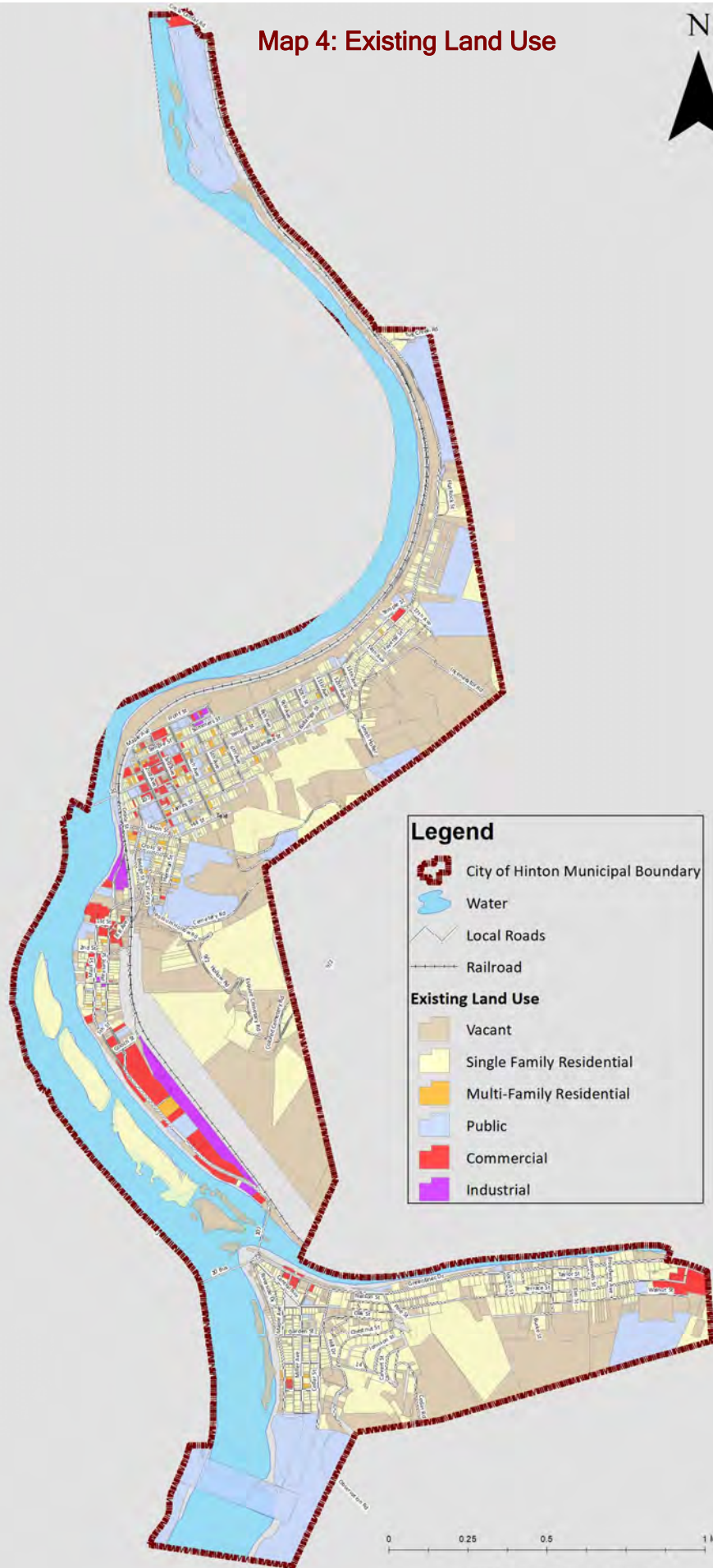
As the county seat of Summers County, numerous government and public uses are located within Hinton, including the Summers County Courthouse; Summers County Board of Education offices; Summers County Library; Summers County Memorial Building; Summers County Elementary, Middle, and High Schools; Hinton City Hall; and numerous churches.

The city includes two distinct and different commercial areas. The downtown business district is comprised of small businesses, restaurants, and retail shops. The other commercial areas generally serve the traveling public and are located along the major roadways, State Routes 107 and 20, in Hinton city limits. Commercial uses include stores with larger footprints, such as gas stations, fast food restaurants, and grocery stores. Industrial uses are located along the railroad. Land classified as vacant on **Map 4: Existing Land Use** is mainly steep slopes or undeveloped lots.



Due to the New and Greenbrier Rivers that run adjacent to Hinton, portions of the city lie within the floodplain, as shown on **Map 5: Development Constraints**. Greenbrier Drive experiences flooding during high waters, but homes have not been affected to date. The City has a floodplain ordinance to regulate development within the floodplain. Sections of the Avis and Bellepoint neighborhoods are located within the floodplain but have not flooded since Bluestone Dam was built. The city currently experiences no subsidence issues.

Map 4: Existing Land Use



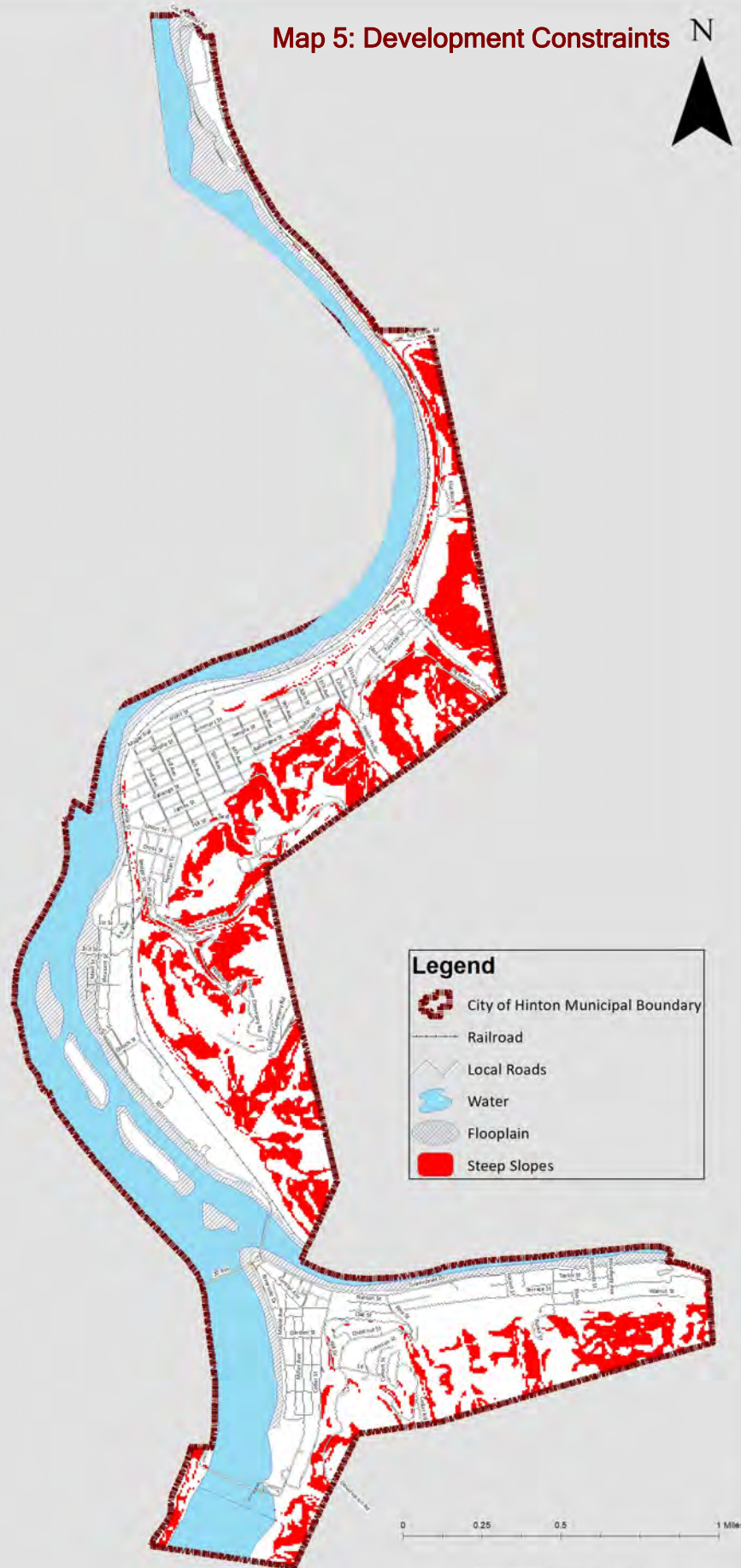

To better regulate land use within the city, local elected officials enacted a zoning ordinance in 1996. The ordinance includes six zoning districts:

- Recreational
- Residential
- Office and Institutions
- Commercial I
- Commercial II
- Industrial

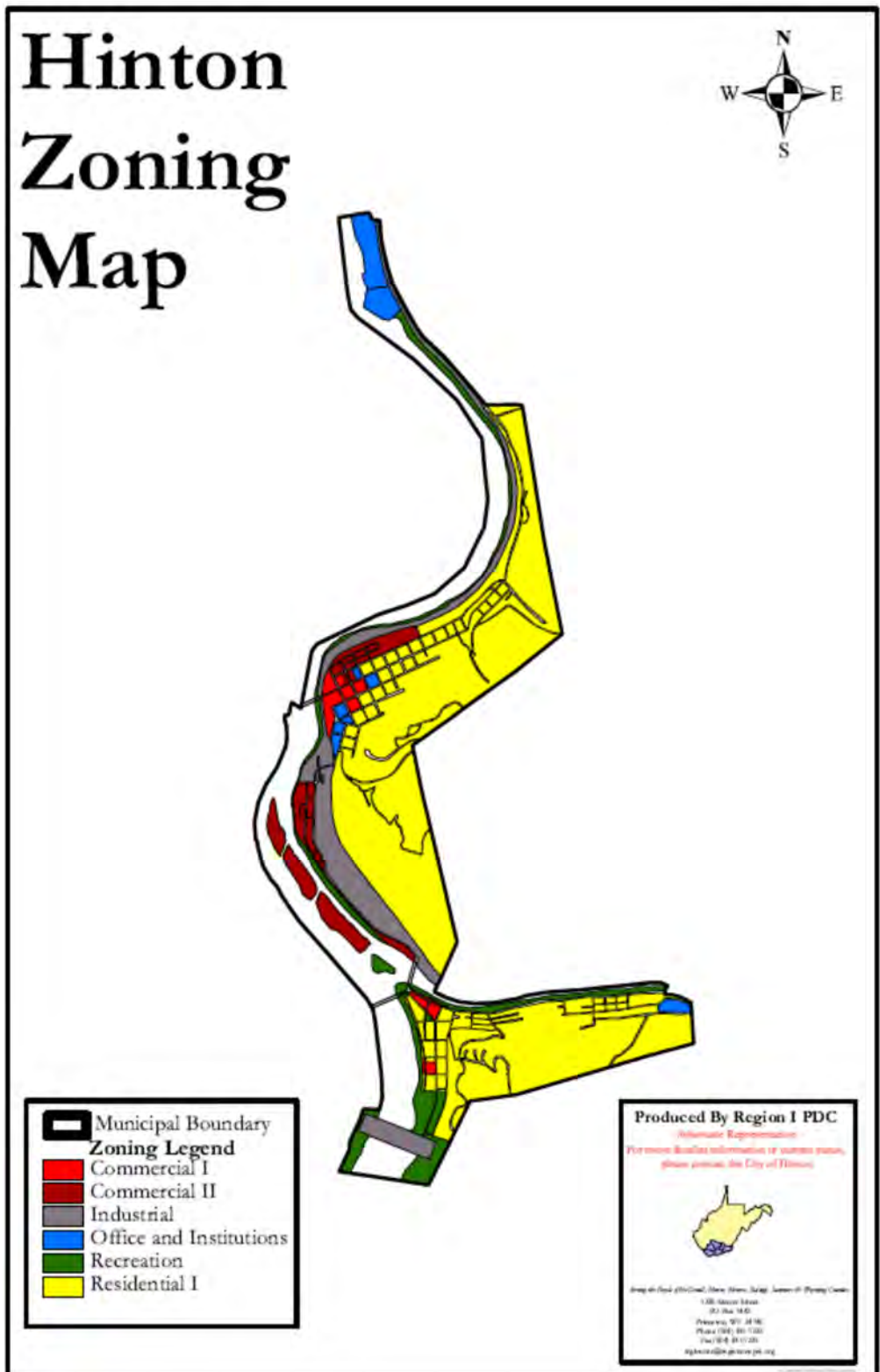
The majority of Hinton is zoned as Residential.

Downtown is zoned

Commercial I,

Commercial II, and Office and Institutions.

According to local elected officials, no issues exist with the current zoning ordinance.





## *Future Land Use*

Hinton's population peaked in 1930 with a total of 6,654 people during the boom of the railroad. Since then, Hinton's population has slowly declined. In 2010, the population was 2,676. Population estimates in 2018 show a further decline to 2,395 people. Population estimates are developed using data on births, deaths, and migration to calculate population change since the most recent decennial census.

To better prepare Hinton for the future, population projections were developed to help local elected officials better understand the services they need to provide based on whether the city will gain or lose population. Population projections are only available for counties in West Virginia and not for municipalities. Summers County is projected to lose 1,403 residents by 2030. Population projections for Hinton were determined evaluating the projection for Summers County and past city population trends. The city has experienced a continued decline in population since 1980. The estimates released by the U.S. Census Bureau in 2018 show a further decline. Assuming population trends continue, by 2030, the city may lose an additional 543 people.

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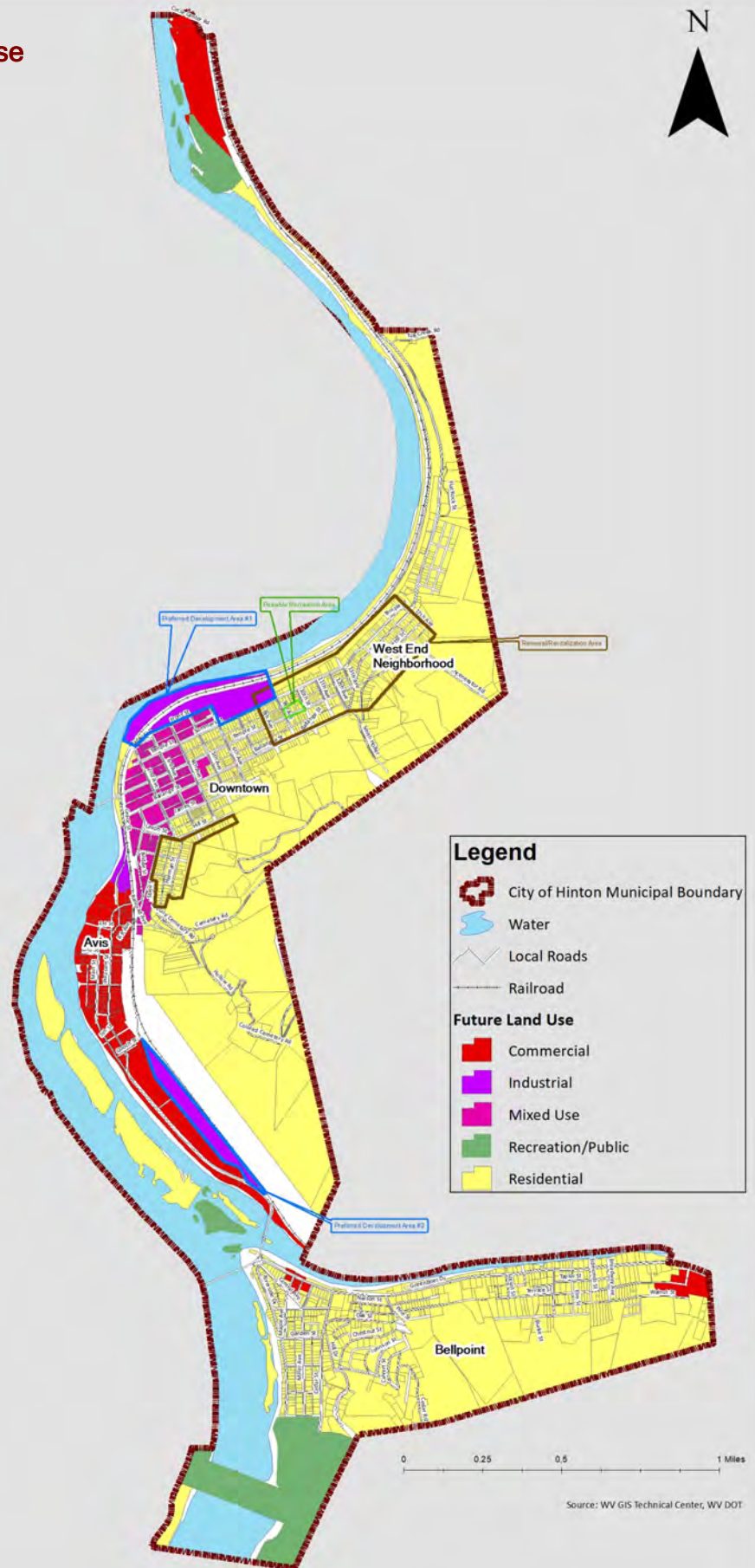
**The City of Hinton is projected to continue to lose population in the next several years**

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A projected population decline indicates that no additional housing is needed. However, during the planning process, residents and local elected officials identified a need for higher-value homes to attract new residents in the middle- and upper-income levels as well as apartments and condos for seniors. The median value of a home in Hinton is \$74,500, which is significantly lower than the median value of a home in Summers County, which is \$95,400. The median home value in a community correlates to the age of housing. Older housing stock tends to have lower value and may require significant renovations and improvements. Approximately 38% of homes in Hinton were built before 1939 and less than 9% of homes were built in the last two decades. At this time, there are no opportunities to reuse buildings for housing within city limits.

**Map 6: Future Land Use** was developed to guide development within the City of Hinton. The future land use map is not a zoning map, but a visual illustration of the vision of the city.

## *Future Land Use Categories*

- **Commercial:** areas intended for large-scale commercial development to serve residents of Hinton and the surrounding region
- **Industrial:** areas intended to allow for limited industrial uses
- **Mixed Use:** downtown commercial development
- **Recreation/Public:** areas intended for recreational and/or public uses
- **Residential:** areas for single-family and/or multi-family development

**Map 6: Future Land Use** also identifies preferred areas for development and renewal and redevelopment areas, in accordance with West Virginia Code, Chapter 8A.

Preferred Development Area #1 consists of approximately 20 acres suitable for industrial development along the railroad tracks. Preferred Development Area #2 lies along State Route 107 and would also be suitable for industrial development.

Several areas were identified as renewal and/or redevelopment areas. These areas are scattered throughout the city and consist of dilapidated residential buildings, some of which are vacant and some of which are occupied. The areas are shown on the future land use map. There are no rural areas in the City of Hinton due to the lack of agriculture and conservation lands within city limits.

A potential future recreational area was identified on Temple Street. This area could be a good location for a small playground, green space or community garden.

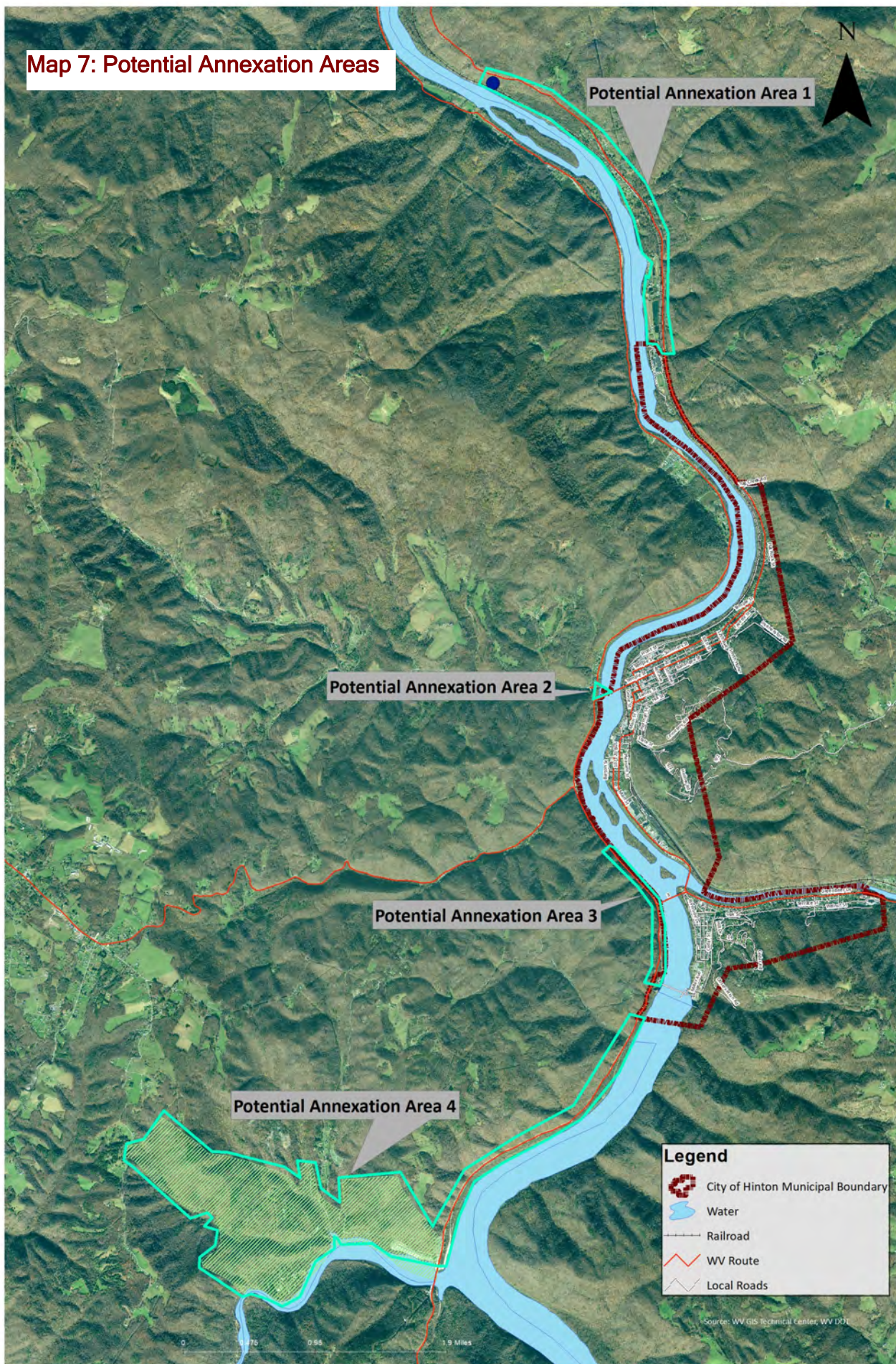

The City considered potential annexation of certain areas near its municipal border. The areas are shown on **Map 7: Potential Annexation Areas:**

- Potential Annexation Area 1: Summers County High School to Brooks Overlook
  - The purpose of annexing this area is to eliminate blight from Route 20 into town and improve river access points. Water and sewer are available.
- Potential Annexation Area 2: Route 20 from the bridge to Raleigh County border, approximately 1 mile
  - The purpose of annexing this area is to provide emergency services to residents along Route 20. This area is already served with water and sewer.
- Potential Annexation Area 3: Bluestone Dam to the Temple Street Bridge on Route 20
  - The purpose of annexing this area is to provide emergency services to local businesses and enhance the general area. This area is already served with water and sewer.
- Potential Annexation Area 4: Bluestone Lake
  - The purpose of annexing this area would be to offer additional recreational events and sponsor events at the lake and not have to rely on other agencies. This area is not served with water and sewer.

The City should coordinate with Summers County on any annexation plan to promote regional planning between the County and City. Recently, the county and city have witnessed an increased emphasis on regional planning. Two members of the Hinton Planning Commission also serve on the Summers County Planning Commission.



### *Historic Preservation*

Historic preservation serves an important an important role in revitalizing the city. Many projects have been completed to preserve important structures in the city. Renovations have been made to the Campbell-Flannagan-Murrell House Museum, which is the oldest house in

town. Repairs included installation of a dehumidifier system and drainage and gutter work to keep the house dry. In 2018, the City of Hinton updated design guidelines to preserve the character of the historic district in downtown Hinton. The City of Hinton Historic Landmarks Commission reviews applications for construction, alteration, relocation, demolition, or repair of any building or site within the historic district. As previously mentioned, MountainPlex Properties has renovated several key historic buildings in downtown Hinton.

## Goal 4: Encourage appropriate land use to protect the character and resources of the city.

Objective: Support historic preservation efforts

Objective: Update land use ordinances to be consistent with comprehensive plan

### Update the zoning ordinance to be consistent with the comprehensive plan

The zoning ordinance, adopted in 1996, should be updated to be compliant with recent changes to West Virginia Code, Chapter 8A. The zoning ordinance update should be consistent with this comprehensive plan, including the **Map 6: Future Land Use**, and include updated definitions and sign regulations.

### Continue historic preservation efforts

There is a need to preserve existing historic buildings within the City of Hinton. Grant money is needed to help with these efforts. The city should work with the West Virginia Historic Preservation Office to obtain grants and technical assistance.

### Explore the feasibility of developing a memorial celebrating Hinton's railroad history

The City is interested in constructing a railroad memorial in city limits. The memorial would include a repurposed caboose. The city would like to construct the memorial in a high

visibility area, such as 2<sup>nd</sup> Avenue. The creation of a memorial would address vacant and dilapidated buildings in the area and provide open space in the community.

#### **Update the floodplain ordinance**

The City should update the floodplain ordinance based on the most recent model floodplain ordinance developed by the West Virginia Division of Homeland Security and Emergency Management.

#### **Consider annexation of property adjacent to city limits**

To continue to grow and increase the tax base, the City should consider annexation of the properties discussed on **Page 57**. Mailings and editorials in the local newspaper should be supportive measures considered by the City to educate residents and property owners on the benefits of annexation.

# OVERVIEW

The work is not completed after a comprehensive plan is adopted. One of the most important and commonly overlooked aspects is the implementation of action items detailed in the plan. To guide implementation for local elected officials, an implementation matrix was created, which details the priority level of each action item, a timeframe for completion, potential partners for financial or technical assistance, estimated costs, and potential funding sources. The Planning Commission should use the implementation matrix to begin implementation of the plan immediately after its adoption by City Council. The Planning Commission should review the plan annually to determine the status of each action item and any obstacles that have been encountered.

The City of Hinton has a limited budget and staff. Therefore, each action item is identified as either high, medium, or low priority. High priorities are those that were identified during the planning process as being the most important to implement. A timeframe for each action step was also identified. While some projects may be high priority, they may take longer to implement due to funding and resources.

The cost of the action items depends on the size and scope of the project. The listed costs are estimates only and not actual costs. To help the City with implementation, a list of funding sources can be found in **Appendix 5**. The City should work with Summers County to find opportunities for cost efficiency and savings. Additionally, the City should collaborate with Region IV Planning and Development Council to implement and fund projects detailed in the comprehensive plan. The City should also look to area foundations for help with implementation. Both the Hinton Area Foundation and Hinton Hope Foundation fund community projects.

# Top Priorities

There are 39 action items detailed in the comprehensive plan. As funding and staff capacity and resources are limited, the Planning Commission decided to choose eight (8) action items to focus efforts on immediately in order to jump start the implementation of the comprehensive plan. All the action items listed in the plan are important, but the top eight should be considered high priorities for the city. The last three action items listed address abandoned and dilapidated buildings. The Planning Commission feels that these 3 (three) action items should be completed in steps.

**Complete paving projects throughout the city**

**Develop a sidewalk plan to help prioritize sidewalk repairs and construction**

**Explore the feasibility of providing additional recreation facilities**

**Increase marketing and promotion of local businesses and attractions**

**Hold additional events to attract visitors**

**Increase code enforcement efforts (Step 1)**

**Continue to host annual city-wide clean-up events (Step 2)**

**Enforce the vacant property registry (Step 3)**

The Planning Commission created a survey to solicit input from the general public on recommendations and how to pay for them. The survey asked residents to select the top five action items they felt the City should focus on implementing first. A total of 402 people participated in the survey. The top five action items chosen by the public are:

### Top 5 Action Items

1. Complete paving projects of roads that are determined to be in particularly bad condition
2. Provide recreational programs for youth, adults, and seniors (programs could include arts and crafts, outdoor adventure, technology, sports, youth soccer league, health/fitness, educational programming, senior fitness, book club, excursions and card games)
3. Continue to provide resources to the police department through budgeting and grants by replacing aging police vehicles, hiring additional police, and increasing patrols
4. Partner with Summers County to provide a School Resource Officer for schools
5. Explore the feasibility of providing an indoor recreation facility, constructing a park in the West End neighborhood, providing additional recreational amenities in Town Square Park, and constructing an amphitheater

*NOTE: The online survey identified adopting an ordinance under WV Code Section 8-12-16 to address structures that are dangerous or detrimental to the community. Hinton adopted that ordinance in February of 2021, so this action step has been removed as a priority.*



**The Comprehensive Plan Procedures for Public Input**


Pursuant to the requirements of W. Va. Code § 8A-3-6(c), the Planning Commission of the City of Hinton, West Virginia ("Hinton Planning Commission") hereby adopts the following procedures to encourage and promote public participation in the drafting of the Hinton Comprehensive Plan ("comprehensive plan"). The comprehensive plan is being drafted pursuant to W. Va. Code § 8A-1-1.


- (1) The Hinton Planning Commission will request input from other affected governing bodies and units of governments that may be affected by the adoption of the comprehensive plan.
- (2) Under W. Va. Code § 8A-3-6(b), once the Hinton Planning Commission has completed a draft of the comprehensive plan, and before the Hinton Planning Commission submits a plan to the City Council for adoption or consent, it must publicize and hold a public hearing on the draft of its plan.
  - a. More particularly, under W. Va. Code § 8A-3-6(b), at least thirty (30) days prior to the date set for the public hearing, the Planning Commission will publish a notice of the date, time and place of the public hearing as a Class I legal advertisement in compliance with the provisions of article three, chapter fifty-nine of the West Virginia Code. The notice shall run in a general circulating publication, the publication area will be the area that will be covered by the comprehensive plan.
  - b. In addition to the requirements at W. Va. Code § 8A-3-6(b), above, the Hinton Planning Commission will publish its draft of the comprehensive plan at least thirty (30) days prior to the public hearing. Specifically, the Planning Commission will post hardcopies for public review at Hinton City Hall.
- (3) Public notice of Hinton Planning Commission meetings will be given pursuant to the West Virginia Open Governmental Proceedings Act, where applicable.
- (4) No provision herein shall be construed as limiting the Hinton Planning Commission's ability to engage in additional public participation efforts as the Hinton Planning Commission deems appropriate. No provision herein shall prohibit the Hinton Planning Commission from amending these procedures.



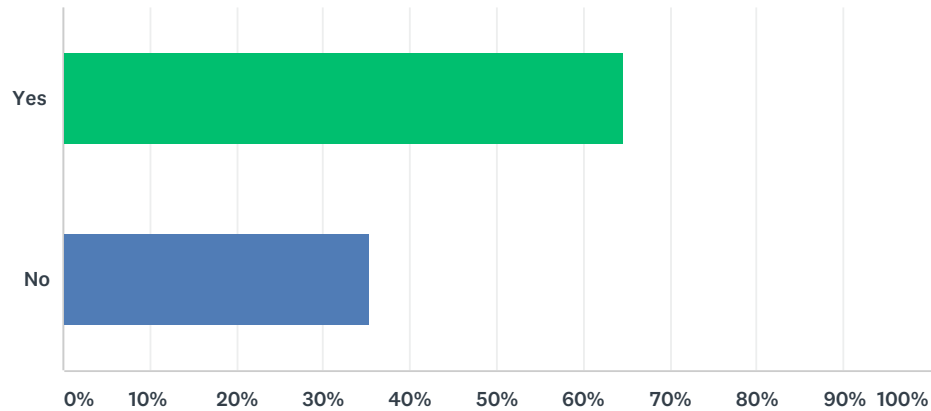

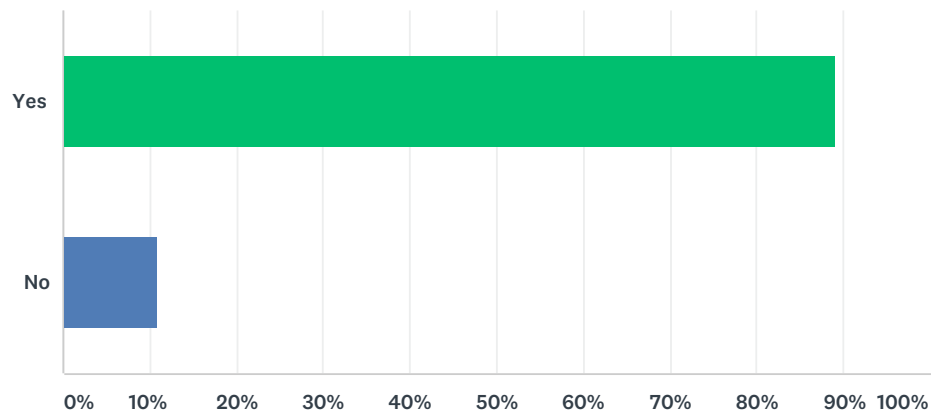

Q4 Are you satisfied with the services provided by the fire department?

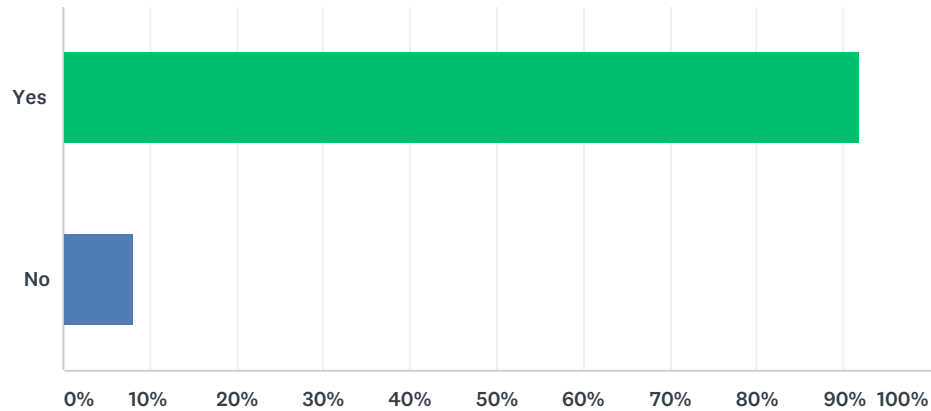

Q5 Would you support increased code enforcement to address abandoned and dilapidated buildings?

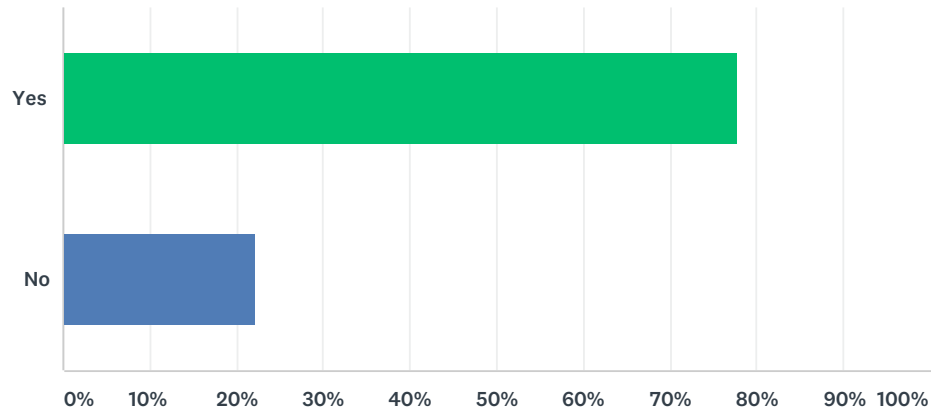

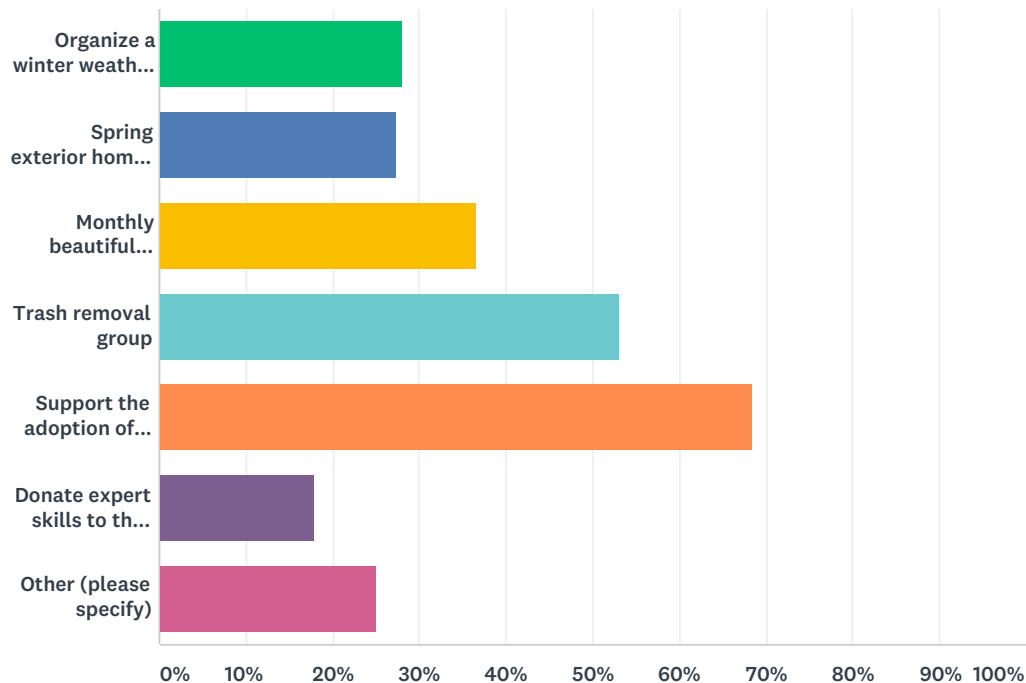

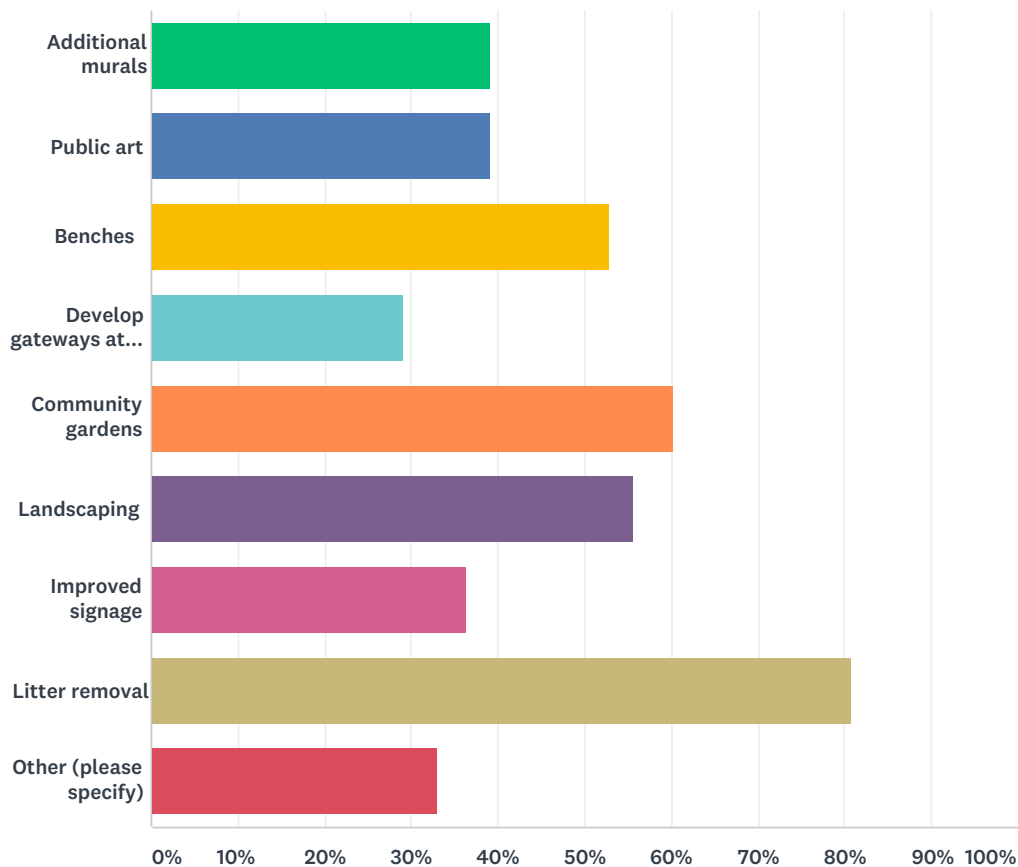

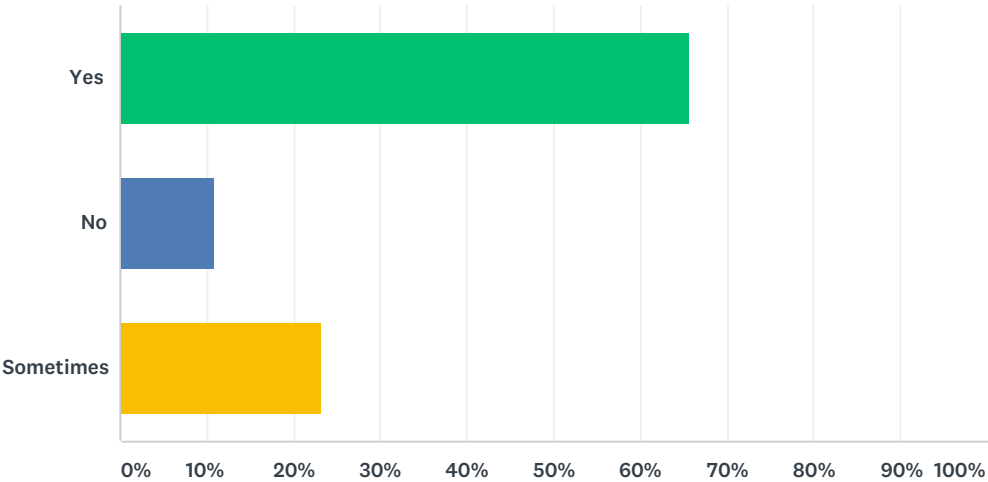

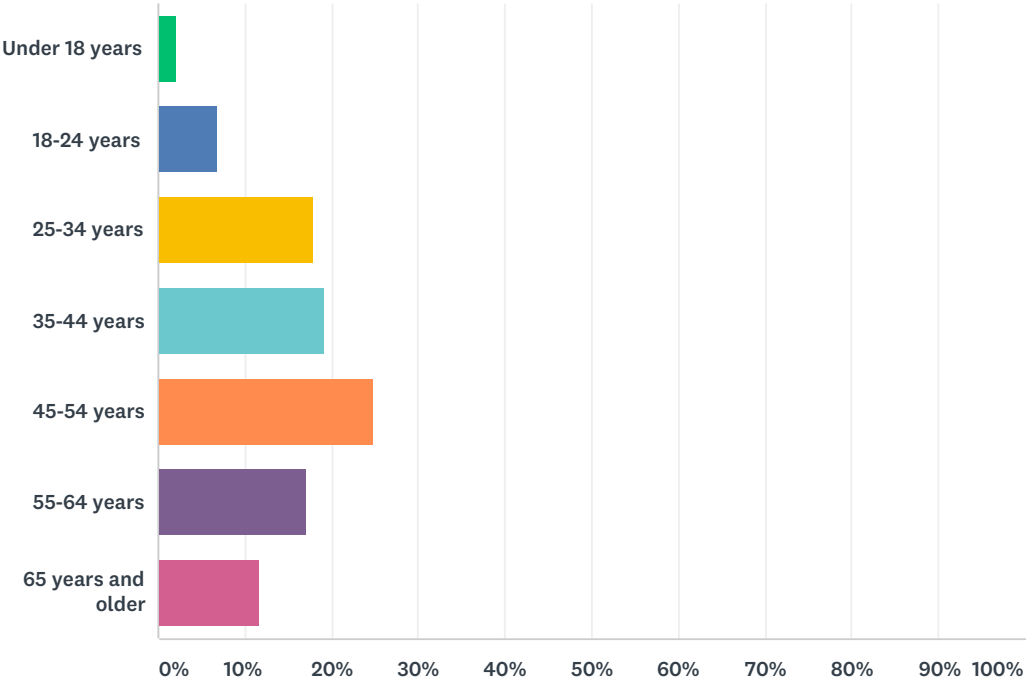

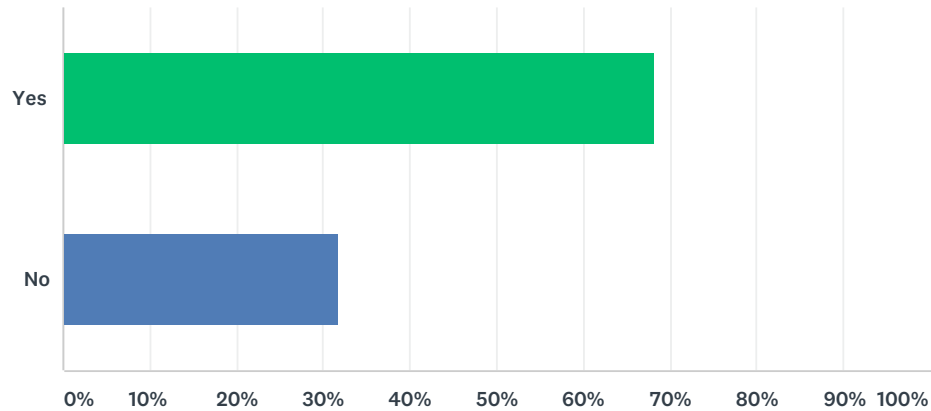

Q18 Do you live in the City of Hinton?

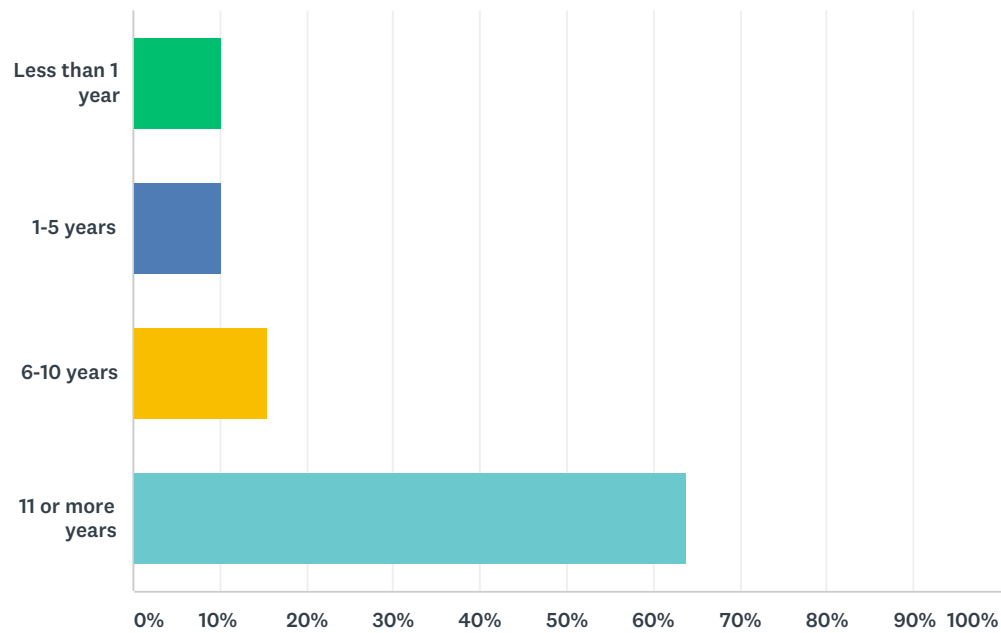

## *Funding Opportunities*

### *Appalachian Regional Commission*

The Appalachian Regional Commission (ARC) provides federal grant funds for the support of economic and community development in West Virginia. The goal of ARC is to create opportunities for self-sustaining economic development and improved quality of life.

Projects approved for ARC assistance must support one of the four general goals:

- Strengthen the capacity of the people of Appalachia to compete in the global economy.
- Increase job opportunities and per capita income in Appalachia to reach parity with the nation.
- Develop and improve Appalachia's infrastructure to make the Region economically competitive.
- Build the Appalachian Development Highway System to reduce Appalachia's isolation.

Activities generally eligible for funding include, but are not limited to, projects that:

- Improve infrastructure for community and economic development.
- Improve educational opportunities and workforce skills.
- Increase civic and leadership capacity.
- Increase entrepreneurial opportunities.
- Improve health care resources.

### *Benedum Foundation*

The mission of the Benedum Foundation is to encourage human development in West Virginia and Southwestern Pennsylvania through strategically placed charitable resources. The foundation gives two types of grants; education and economic development.

### *Governors Community Participation Grant Program*

The Governor's Community Partnership Grant program provides state grant funds for community and economic development projects throughout West Virginia. The program enables communities to expand, build and improve a variety of public facilities and services.

Eligible activities include but are not limited to permanent public improvements related to the following:

- City hall and courthouse facilities
- Community centers
- Construction and renovation of public facilities
- Demolition
- Economic development
- Flood and storm drainage
- Business and industrial parks
- Land and property acquisition
- Libraries

- Technology
- Water and wastewater facilities and services

### ***KaBOOM***

KaBoom is a non-profit organization that is dedicated to creating play spaces for children throughout the United States. KaBoom offers three types of grants:

- **Build it with KaBOOM!**- work with KaBOOM! and their corporate partners. This grant provides coaching and facilitation of an experienced Project Manager to help design and build a permanent play structure
- **Build it Yourself**- grant (\$15,000) to be used toward the purchase of playground equipment
- **Creative Play Grants**- used to design play equipment that encourages creativity, communication, and collaboration in play

### ***Land and Water Conservation Fund***

The Land and Water Conservation Fund program (LWCF) provides supplemental federal funding for the acquisition and/or development of high- quality, public outdoor recreational areas throughout West Virginia. Proposed projects must be consistent with the Statewide Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan (SCORP). Park renovations, expansions to promote active lifestyles, innovation in community cores, attracting or retain visitors to an area, development of trailheads or preservation of other natural areas to impact community health objectives and brownfields renewal efforts will receive funding priority.

Eligible activities include but are not limited to the development of outdoor recreation resources related to the following:

- “ Land acquisition for parklands
- “ Development or renovation of the following types of outdoor recreational facilities:
- “ Campgrounds
- “ Picnic areas
- “ Sports and playfields
- “ Golf courses
- “ Swimming facilities
- “ Boating facilities
- “ Fishing facilities
- “ Hunting areas
- “ Trails
- “ Winter sport facilities
- “ Support facilities (walks, utilities, bathrooms, etc.)
- “ Amphitheaters
- “ Lake impoundments
- “ Visitor information centers
- “ Interpretive centers

### ***Neighborhood Investment Program***

The Neighborhood Investment Program (NIP) increases charitable giving to local nonprofit organizations. The program allows 501(c)3 designated charitable organizations to apply for tax credit vouchers. These organizations distribute the vouchers to contributing businesses and individuals. By donating to approved NIP organizations, contributors can support their communities and earn credits to reduce certain West Virginia taxes.

The West Virginia Legislature sets aside \$2.5 million annually in state tax credits for the NIP. To participate, a 501(c)3 charitable organization must apply to the West Virginia Development Office. Upon meeting program requirements and obtaining approval from the NIP Advisory Board, organizations are awarded tax credit vouchers. Businesses and

individuals that contribute to NIP-approved organizations are eligible to receive up to 50 percent of the contributed amount in the form of state tax credits. Donors may use the credits to reduce liability for the Corporate Net Income Tax, the Business Franchise tax or the Personal Income Tax.

Projects generally eligible for program participation include but are not limited to the following:

- Health clinics
- Homeless shelters
- Educational programs
- Housing programs
- Preservation/revitalization activities
- Domestic violence shelters
- Children's shelters
- Meal delivery programs
- Senior citizens' centers
- Community foundations
- Scholarship programs
- Hospice care
- Transportation programs
- Day care centers
- Counseling services
- Services for the disabled

### *Small Cities Block Grant Fund*

The Small Cities Block Grant program (SCBG) provides federal funds for community and economic development projects throughout West Virginia. The program supports job creation and retention efforts, local government efforts to provide affordable infrastructure systems and community efforts to improve the quality of life for low- to moderate-income citizens. Eligible units of local government may receive SCBG funds if they are documented to fulfill one of three national objectives:

- Activities benefiting low- and moderate-income people.
- Activities that aid in the prevention or elimination of slums or blight.
- Activities designed to meet community development needs having a particular urgency because existing conditions pose a serious and immediate threat to the health or welfare of the community and where other financial resources are not available to meet such needs.

Activities generally eligible for funding include but are not limited to permanent public improvements related to the following:

- Community centers/senior citizen centers
- Construction and renovation of public facilities
- Demolition
- Economic development
- Flood and storm drainage
- Acquisition
- Parks and recreation
- Preservation and beautification
- Technology
- Water and wastewater facilities and services
- Community facilities renovation/construction

### *Smart Growth Implementation Assistance*

The Smart Growth Implementation Assistance (SGIA) program provides assistance from national experts to help communities explore barriers to smart growth implementation and pilot innovative ideas that create more sustainable communities. EPA will provide technical assistance to successful applicants.

### *Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP)*

TAP provides funding for programs and projects defined as transportation alternatives, including on- and off-road pedestrian and bicycle facilities, infrastructure projects for improving non-driver access to public transportation and enhanced mobility, community improvement activities, and environmental mitigation; recreational trail program projects; safe routes to school projects; and projects for planning, designing, or constructing boulevards and other roadways largely in the right-of-way of former Interstate System routes or other divided highways.

The TAP program now funds projects that would have previously been considered under the Transportation Enhancement and Safe Routes to Schools Programs.

### *The Greater Kanawha Valley Foundation (GKVF)*

The Greater Kanawha Valley Foundation (GKVF) encompasses Kanawha, Putnam, Boone, Clay, Lincoln, and Fayette Counties in West Virginia. The Foundation helps individuals, families, businesses, and nonprofits improve the lives within the community now and for generations to come. They assist donors in creating charitable funds, each with its own philanthropic purpose, and provide grants to nonprofits that meet the needs of the community.

There are two discretionary grantmaking tracks:

- Proactive collaborative grants in education, health, and civic engagement and community building
- Responsive grants in basic needs or arts and culture

To be eligible for both discretionary grantmaking programs, an applicant must:

- Be a 501(c)(3) nonprofit, public school, or government entity
- Demonstrate the ability to build community wealth
- Serve Kanawha, Putnam, Lincoln, Boone, Clay, and/or Fayette Counties of WV
- Have an audit, financial review, or financial compilation

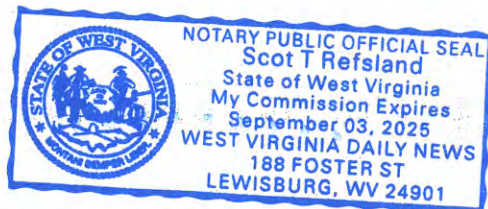

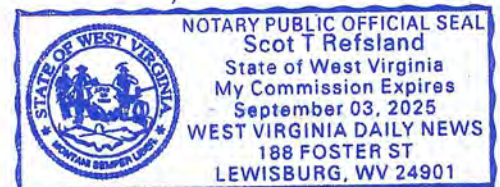
